



Black History Month — *My Children! My Africa!*

Mr. Athol Fugard's *My Children! My Africa!* will be presented at 7 p.m. Friday, February 16, in Reitz High School Auditorium as the feature of USI's 1996 Black History Month observance.

Mr. Fugard's play arose from his familiarity with South Africa and his fear that blacks and whites would become too polarized to allow a united South Africa to emerge. He has set it in 1984, when unrest began to spread.

Photo exhibition

A photographic exhibition on display at Audubon Park Museum in Henderson, Kentucky, provides recent historical background on South Africa and insight into some of the issues presented in *My Children! My Africa!*

The collection of black and white photos by Ms. Susan Winters were shot from 1988 through 1995, a span that includes the last years of the revolt against apartheid, the political climate in which *My Children! My Africa!* is set.

An article in *The Evansville Courier* notes the exhibition, "South Africa: The Quiet Revolution — One Song, Many Voices" is filled with powerful, dynamic photos of black South Africans quietly effecting their own liberation from poverty and oppression in daily acts...building roads with picks, harvesting corn from a village garden, teaching children in a volunteer school, and worshipping, protesting, and celebrating together."

The Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs will notify applicants of awards by April 15.
