MARILYN DURHAM EXHIBIT AT ISUE

A Marilyn Durham exhibition is on display at the University Library according to Mrs. Josephine Elliott, University Archivist. The display will feature the original manuscript of Mrs. Durham's popular novel, The Man Who Loved Cat Dancing. The display will coincide with the local showing of the movie version of Mrs. Durham's work starring Sara Miles and Burt Reynolds.

The ISUE collection is comprised of the first typescript draft of the book written January through March, 1970; the second typescript draft of the book written March through May, 1970; the first galley sheets; the final page proofs; xerox copy of a letter to her copy editor; the story timetable; and a synopsis of the book. After the publishers have released the edited copy, it and the correspondence relating to it will be added to the University collection.

NEWS CONFERENCE

Congressman Roger Zion will be on campus Monday, July 2, for a 9:30 a.m. news conference to discuss the receipt of a \$115,776.00 grant to the ISUE Division of Education. The grant, written by Glenn Kinzie, Professor of Education, will allow for a workshop to acquaint persons in education with necessary tools to identify minority needs and problems in the classroom. The grant was obtained through the support of Congressman Zion and the Evansville-Vanderburgh School Corporation. The program will be funded by the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.

STUDENTS RESEARCHING ANIMALS AT MESKER ZOO

"The male is following the female into the pond," records ISUE junior Allen Hite. Allen, along with three other ISUE summer session students, is involved in a special research project at Mesker Zoo this summer. The students are observing breeding and maternal habits of the capybara, a South American rodent. Mesker Zoo is the only zoo where capybara breed. The local zoo has two females and one male.

The project, under the direction of Susan Donaldson, Assistant Professor of Psychology, through the cooperation of Mike Zulak, Curator at Mesker Zoo, provides students more than a laboratory experience. The students hope to publish a paper of the project.

Mesker Zoo officials noted that 50% of the capybara offspring are lost during pregnancy or die soon after birth. The students will examine ways of lowering the mortality

rate. This could mean an economic benefit to Mesker Zoo. As the only zoo where capybara breed, Mesker Zoo supplies capybara for many zoos.

Very little is known about the capybara. It is an aquatic 200 lb. rodent found in South America. It is one of the oldest animals on the phylogenetic scale.

Students participating in the research project along with Allen Hite are Tim Wortz, junior Psychology major, and Skip Strehl, a graduate of Taylor University doing summer work at ISUE.

ENERGY DILEMMA REVIEWED

Herschel Whitham, Vanderburgh County Extension Agent representative from Purdue University, hosted a live broadcast via the Indiana Higher Education Telecommunication System from Purdue University on the ISUE campus on June 27, 1973 at 9:00 a.m. The first half of the program dealt with the general energy dilemma facing Hoosiers and the second half of the program was concerned with energy and the 1973 Indiana fall crop harvest.

The first part of the closed circuit television program presented an overview of the energy dilemma, a perspective on the energy situation, with special attention to fuel for the agricultural needs of Indiana farmers. Discussion was given to the problems of transportation and distribution of fuel, the inadequate storage facilities of great quantities of fuel, and with Americans' preoccupation with such crises as outer space exploration and Watergate rather than with the fuel shortage which now is beginning to directly affect Indiana citizens. Hoosiers are urged to be judicious in their usage of energy, both electric and fuel, and to be prepared to accept the fact that it is inherent that the country will always be running on a deficit of natural resources if it continues its excessive usage. A discussion also dealt with environmentalists and their role in the energy shortage and the cost/risk/benefit ratio in energy usage.

The second part of the energy crisis program was primarily of interest to farmers, agri-business, educators, and government. Climatological and agronomic data currently being assembled and its use in predicting maturity and harvest moisture were discussed. An overview of the current status of Indiana crops, the opportunities and limitations of manipulating tillage practices and varieties to conserve energy were explored. Electric drying and other low heat and no-heat drying procedures in the technique, management and performance of drying crops were investigated.

Throughout the closed circuit television program attended by the media, local farmers, and concerned agri-business people, questions were directly phoned to the panel of Purdue University specialists.

ISUE RECEIVES PHOTOGRAPHY COLLECTION

The University Archives have received the John Waring Doane Photography Collection set up in Mr. Doane's memory as a gift to the university by his widow, Mrs. Anne Doane. John Doane was a former Mt. Vernon area photographer.

The gift becomes a part of ISUE's special collection project, made possible in mid-August of last year by a \$70,000 grant by Lilly Endowment, Inc. of Indianapolis.

The grant allowed ISUE to set up the archival library, providing a three-year program to launch the project.

The Doane Collection includes 21 large salon photographs, 183 slides, 175 glass plates and 110 assorted items.

The photo collection illustrates New Harmony landmarks, Posey County scenes, nature studies, people, and work Mr. Doane did for James Associates, an Indianapolis based architectural firm.

The photography collection will have the optimum accessibility in the archives of the Library. The archive office is located in the Indiana Room on third floor of the Library.
