NON-CREDIT COURSES OFFERED, "Sixteen courses will be offered in the fall non-credit community service series at Indiana State University Evansville," according to M. EDWARD JONES, Director of Continuing Education at ISUE. "We are offering courses for personal enrichment, skills development, and special training to meet the needs of a variety of individuals."

Two of those courses will begin during the first and second weeks of September. Efficient Studying Techniques, a course designed to benefit incoming college freshmen, current students in need of better study skills, and adults continuing their education, will be offered in two sections.

Section I will meet eight consecutive Wednesdays, September 1 through October 20 in University Center, Room 353. Section II will be held in the Library, Room 107 on Tuesdays, October 19 through December 17. Both sections will be held from 6:30 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. The cost of the course is \$30.00 which includes all materials to be used.

Career and Life Planning is a course designed to increase self-awareness and knowledge of various educational alternatives and possible career options. Participants will become familiar with available information resources regarding the life-long process of career-planning and will receive individual assistance with career decision-making. Persons wanting to receive credit for the course should register for GenS 111X (Code 2998). The course carries one hour.

"Oceans: Our Continuing Frontier" will be offered in the course by newspaper series which provides readers the opportunity to earn college credit by studying articles printed in the Evansville Courier. Channel 9 will be airing the popular series "The Adams Chronicles."

A series of 16 articles will be published in the Evansville Courier beginning Monday, September 20 and will run each Monday thereafter until January 3, 1977. Three required class meetings with the instructor will be held in the ISUE Library, Room 107. The first organizational meeting will be Thursday, September 16 at 7:00 p.m.

ISUE Assistant Professor of Geology and Geography Jack Barnes will coordinate the course. It will carry two semester hours. Persons can register by calling the Office of Continuing Education no later than September 16, 1976.

"The Adams Chronicles" will consist of 13 one-hour telecasts aired on WNIN-Channel 9. Between 1750 and 1900, the Adams Family gave the United States its second and sixth presidents, a vice-president, a delegate to the two Continental Congresses, a secretary of state, several ambassadors, and a host of other important figures.

Three class meetings are also required for this class. The organizational meeting will be held on September 14 at 7:00 p.m. in the ISUE Library, Room 107. ISUE Associate Professor of Political Science, William Kirsch, will conduct the class. It carries two semester hours.
