Dr. Marie Bussing-Burks of Evansville is visiting assistant professor of economics. She has been an adjunct instructor in economics at USI, a work management analyst at Citizens National Bank, and a visiting instructor at the University of Evansville, where she was a 1980 cum laude graduate, receiving a B.A. in elementary education. May, former Vietnam veteran's aide in Evansville who was selected by Governor Evan Bayh in 1989 to be director of the Indiana Department of Veterans Affairs, has rejoined the USI faculty as assistant professor of social work. He has a B.A. from the University of Evansville and an M.S. from the University of Tennessee. He also has been director of vocational rehabilitation and executive assistant at the Indiana Department of Human Services, manager of outpatient services at Charter Hospital, Indianapolis, president of a private clinical practice, and consultant to business, industry, and human services organizations in Evansville. He previously was an adjunct faculty member at USI.

Ms. Jane E. Meyer is assistant professor of education. She has a B.A. in history/political science/education from Millikin University, Decatur, Illinois, and M.A. in teaching and early childhood education from Oklahoma City University; she is a doctoral candidate at Oklahoma State University, where she was a graduate teaching assistant. She was an adjunct lecturer at Northeast OSU and at OCU, where she was co-director of the Even Start Evaluation Project. She held leadership and teaching positions from 1971 to 1987 with Sunbeam Family Services in Oklahoma City, and previously taught in Decatur public schools.

Ms. Doris J. Mohr of Ferdinand, Indiana, a 1987 USI graduate, has joined the faculty as instructor in mathematics. She received an M.A. this year from Indiana University, where she has been an asso-

STIPENDS AVAILABLE. September 18 is the deadline for USI faculty members to enter competition for the 1993 National Endowment for the Humanities Summer Stipends program. The stipends provide support for faculty in the humanities to devote two months of full-time study and research to projects that contribute to scholarly knowledge, to conception and substance of individual courses, or to the public understanding of the humanities. The project may be part of a long-range endeavor; it does not have to be completed during the stipend tenure.
