PSYCHOLOGY CONFERENCE TO INCLUDE PROGRAM ON STUDENT CHEATING

The seventh annual Mid-America Conference for Teachers of Psychology will be held Friday and Saturday, October 12-13, in the University Center. Dr. Joseph J. Palladino, chair of the Psychology Department and conference organizer, said more than 100 participants from across the country are expected to attend for the second straight year.

Among conference highlights will be a presentation by Dr. Steve Davis of Emporia State University, immediate past president of the Division of Teaching, American Psychological Association, in a concurrent session at 2:15 p.m. Friday. He will repeat his presidential address, "Academic Dishonesty in the 1990s: Data and Dilemmas," which was presented at an APA meeting in August in Boston, printed in *The New York Times*, and picked up by news media across the country. It is a report on data collected by Dr. Davis and his colleagues in four years of research, involving interviews with more than 6,000 students across the nation, detailing how extensive cheating is among college and university students, and when and why they cheat.

NEWMAN LECTURE -- 'RELIGION AND THE ENVIRONMENT'

Dr. John F. Haught, chair of the Department of Theology at Georgetown University, will deliver the third annual John Henry Newman Lecture at 7 p.m. Tuesday, October 16, in Forum III, sponsored by the USI Newman Community.

Dr. Haught will outline essential features of religions, then show how religion does and does not contribute to the task of saving the earth. He will offer a few suggestions on how Christian theology is being transformed in light of the environmental crisis. Dr. Haught also will speak at 10 a.m. Wednesday, October 17, in OC2008, where he will give a brief sketch of how science and ethics relate to religious discourse.

Dr. Haught received his Ph.D. from Catholic University. He is the author of numerous books, including *What is Religion?* (1990), *The Revelation of God in History* (1988), *What is God?* (1986), *The Cosmic Adventure* (1984), and *Nature and Purpose* (1980). His recent articles include "The Environment and Cosmic Homelessness," "Science Education and the Importance of Story," and "God in Modern Science."

Other highlights of the Mid-America Conference will be keynote speeches at 10:45 a.m. Friday by Dr. Jane Halonen of Alvemo College and at 4:30 p.m. Friday by Dr. Laurel Furumoto of Wellesley College. Dr. Halonen's topic will be "Mindful Teaching in Hostile Times." Dr. Furumoto, who focuses on the history of and women pioneers in psychology, will discuss "Beyond Great Men and Origin Myths in Teaching the History of Psychology."

In addition, Dr. Sandra M. Singer, USI assistant vice president for Academic Affairs and professor of psychology; Dr. Sid Hall, USI assistant professor of psychology; Dr. Halonen; and Dr. G. William Hill IV of Kennesaw State College will conduct a round table discussion at 3:15 p.m. Friday on "Curriculum Revision in Psychology -- Why, When, and How?"

New Harmony Gallery -- "ABOUT THE ENVIRONMENT"

The works of Ms. Janet Ballweg, print-maker/painter, and Mr. Tony Kukich, ceramic sculptor, will be featured in an "About the Environment" exhibition at the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art. The public is invited to the opening reception from 1 to 4 p.m. Sunday, October 7; the exhibition will continue through November 14.

Both artists portray their concerns about how we, as individuals and as a society, try to impose a sense of order on the landscape we occupy.

Ms. Ballweg, whose work explores the "precarious relationship" created when man-made objects invade the landscape, said, "It is the interaction of these two seemingly disparate worlds of man and nature which causes a dilemma and it is the viewer who is left to determine how the struggle will end." Currently an assistant professor at Bowling Green State University in Ohio, she received a B.S. from the University of Wisconsin and M.F.A. from the University of Illinois.

Mr. Kukich builds machines that are organic in form and men who are sometimes organic, sometimes machined, to present the viewer with images of machines and men and the subtle dominance of nature contrasted with a sense of frailty. Mr. Kukich teaches at Bimidihi State University in Minnesota; he received a B.F.A. from Bimidihi and M.F.A. from Indiana University.

The conference will provide an opportunity to learn how various communication technologies are being used to link geographically separated learners and teachers.
