## FALL SEMESTER OPENS AUGUST 31

(USI Bookstore, Library schedules inside)

Activity is picking up rapidly as students, faculty, and administrative staff prepare for the start of 1992 Fall Semester on Monday, August 31.

Family orientation on **Sunday, August 23**, will begin with a nondenominational service at 11 a.m. Orientation activities will start at 1 p.m. in the Physical Activities Center (PAC) and move to the Orr Center for academic meetings, breakout sessions, and AMIGO (Ask Me I Give Orientation) campus tours. A reception for new students and their families will be held from 3 to 5 p.m. at the University Home. Students will

be treated to a "drive-in" movie at 8:30 p.m., behind the PAC.

The Fall Faculty and Administrative Staff Meeting will start at 8:30 a.m. **Monday, August 24**, in Forum I. Coffee will be available at 8 a.m. The program will feature **Dr. Barry Kroll** of the Indiana University English Department in a discussion on ethics in the curricula. Group discussions will follow at scattered sites.

Monday's activities also will include the information tent opening at 8 a.m. in front of Orr Center; student orientation at 8:30 a.m. in the PAC; AMIGO breakout sessions at 10:30 a.m., various locations; student/faculty meetings at 1:15 p.m., Orr Center; campus tours, 1:45 p.m.; intramural orientation, 3 p.m., PAC; and a luau at 6 p.m., Mid-America Student Housing.
