Degas at the Dayton Art Institute - A fall trip planned September 16-17-18 by USI Extended Services will be an Indiana/Ohio weekend filled with antiques, art, airplanes, and architecture. The centerpiece will be a Saturday morning visit to the \$1.2-million exhibit of sculpture and paintings by the French impressionist, Edgar Degas, on display at the Dayton Art Institute. En route to Dayton, the group will stop for Friday lunch at the Golden Lamb Inn in Lebanon, Ohio, and browse in Lebanon's antique shops. Saturday's agenda also includes the Air Force Museum at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, where everything from Presidential planes to Glenn Miller's trombone are on display. En route home, the travelers will stop in Columbus, Indiana, for a driving tour of buildings designed by noted architects I.M. Pei and Alvar Aalto. Highway ribbon cutting: The Vanderburgh County Commissioners plan a ribbon-cutting ceremony at 12 noon to open the Highway 62 overpass/entrance to the campus. University officials also will participate. The new bridge and three of the ramps are expected to open that afternoon. The next morning, the temporary campus entrance just west of the bridge will be closed to allow work to be completed on the fourth ramp, which will become the primary campus access for eastbound traffic. The work is expected to take four weeks. After the ribbon-cutting, all westbound traffic entering the campus and all traffic leaving the campus will be able to use the new interchange.
