CREDIT BY EXAMINATION

The Ad Hoc Committee on Credit by Examination has been involved during the recent weeks in developing the basic structure for a program of credit by examination to be submitted to the Faculty Council.

A critical point of any program of credit by examination is the selection of tests to be utilized in such a program. The Committee on Credit by Examination has indicated that the members of the faculty in each academic discipline should be responsible for this procedure. To this end, the Office of Admissions has secured specimen copies of nationally administered examinations that are commonly used for credit by examination purposes at colleges and universities in the United States.

These examinations are available for review to faculty members under the following provisions:

1. The examinations must be reviewed in the Office of Admissions. A reading area will be provided for this purpose. This is a necessity due to a prior agreement with the Educational Testing Service and the College Entrance Examination Board.
2. Comment sheets should be returned to the Director of Admissions so that input can be made to the Committee on Credit by Examination.
3. Evening review hours can be arranged at a faculty member's request.

Informational materials about each test will be provided at the reading tables. Please note that we have severe time limitations for the return of the specimen sets, therefore prompt response is requested.

AVAILABLE TESTS AND EXPLANATIONS

The Advanced Placement Program (APP)

The APP is a unique program offered by the College Entrance Examination Board to serve the accelerated student in the high schools. In this program CEEB provides an outline and recommended readings to be used by a high school instructor to teach the course as an advanced class offering. The course content is college level and is designated to prepare a student for an end-of-course examination. The tests are read and scored by educators for CEEB. Scores are reported to colleges on a scale of 1 (low) to 5 (high) with most colleges accepting 3 or better to establish credit. Return date: February 25, 1972. Tests: American History, Biology, Chemistry, English, European History, German (tape included), Math 1 (Calculus AB), Math 2 (Calculus BC) Physics (B and C) and Spanish (tape included).

College Board Placement Examinations (Commonly called CEEB Achievement Tests)

The CEEB Placement Examinations are administered in conjunction with the Scholastic Aptitude Test. One to three examinations cost the student \$10.50 in addition to the \$6.50 necessary for the SAT. Colleges that utilize these examinations for credit purposes usually allow credit if the student achieves college sophomore norms. These examinations may also be used for placement purposes. These examinations are scored by College Board with results sent to the university. Return date: February 25, 1972. Tests: American History and Social Studies, Biology, Chemistry, English Composition, European History and World Cultures, German Listening, German Reading, Literature, Math Level 1, Math Level 2, Intermediate Mathematics, Advanced Mathematics, Physics, Spanish Listening, Spanish Reading.

The College Level Examination Program (CLEP)

The CLEP examinations are becoming the most popular batteries due to the fact that they are gaining wide usage in the armed services as well as in innovative programs in civilian life. You may recognize this test battery in association with the Abraham Lincoln television advertisement concerning "college credit for your experience."

The CLEP program can actually be functionally divided into two testing programs. The first, the General Examinations, are commonly used to establish up to 30 semester hours (or 45 quarter hours) credit for successful completion of the battery. The credentials of these examinations would be valuable for review by all faculty members. Return date: March 3, 1972. Tests: English Composition, No subscores; Humanities, Subscores: Fine Arts, Literature; Mathematics, Subscores: Skills, Content; Natural Sciences, Subscores: Biological, Physical; Social Science, Subscores: Social Science, History.

The second part of the CLEP program involves college level examinations designed to establish credit for specific courses. These examinations are not as widely used as the General Examination battery but are gaining in popularity. Return date: March 3, 1972. Tests: American Government*, American History*, American Literature*, Analysis and Interpretation of Literature*, Biology*, College Algebra, College Algebra-Trigonometry, Computers and Data Processing, Educational Psychology*, Elementary Computer Programming - Fortran IV*, English Composition*, English Literature*, General Chemistry*, General Psychology*, Geology*, History of American Education*, Human Growth and Development*, Accounting*, Business Law*, Business Management*, Calculus*, Economics*, Marketing*, Sociology*, Money and Banking, and Statistics*. *indicates optional essay section available.

The Ad Hoc Committee on Credit by Examination does not desire this request for inspection to be misconstrued as an intention to dictate the use of these examinations for a credit by examination program on the Evansville Campus. The fact remains that these examinations offer the student easy accessibility due to the national administration system. It also offers our University an opportunity to compare our students on a national basis with other colleges and universities and to establish credit for the non-traditional educational experiences a student may have profited from in his or her lifetime.
