OPEN ENROLLMENT FOR BLUE CROSS-BLUE SHIELD INSURANCE

The Blue Cross-Blue Shield group insurance program at ISUE provides that once each year during the month of November an open enrollment period is made available to all employees who have not previously enrolled. Those who wish to take advantage of this open

enrollment opportunity should visit the Personnel Office. Your coverage will be effective November 10, 1973, if you complete the necessary enrollment card and make a cash payment by Friday, November 9, 1973. The cost is \$6.50 a month for single coverage or \$18.00 per month for family coverage. If you choose to wait and begin payment by payroll deduction, the effective date of your insurance will be December 10, 1973.

EQUITABLE MAJOR MEDICAL INSURANCE CONTRACT RENEWAL

The master contract for group major medical insurance at ISUE has been renewed with The Equitable Life Assurance Society of the United States. For the first time in 16 years a premium increase is necessary due to increased hospital-medical-dental costs and the increase in the number of claims paid for individuals covered by this program.

For a nominal additional increase the company has also agreed to substantially increase the maximum benefits available under this insurance coverage. The program had provided a maximum of \$25,000 in medical benefits per covered dependent; under the new policy this coverage has been increased to \$50,000 per covered dependant. The maximum reinsurance benefit each calendar year has also been increased from \$1,000 to \$5,000 per year for each calendar year in which major medical benefits have been paid for an individual.

The following premium rates will become effective November 1, 1973:

The company has also requested a review of the above new rates in six months to determine if a satisfactory claims-premium ratio has been re-established.

Payroll deductions reflecting the above rate changes will be made beginning with all payroll checks issued November 1 and thereafter. Bi-weekly and regular hourly personnel will have an adjustment deduction taken on the November 9 paycheck for the new premium rates which will be due on November 1. Deductions have already been made during the month of October for November premiums based on the old rates.

INDIAN SUMMER RUMMAGE SALE

The Student Government of ISUE (inconjunction with WGBF) is sponsoring an Indian Summer Rummage Sale in the Forum on Saturday, November 17. All items will sell for only one dollar per item with the exception of one special table. Items on this table will be sold by silent auction. Highest bidders will be notified at the conclusion of the Rummage Sale.

Donations are needed for the sale, and S.G.A. is looking for undamaged glassware, small appliances that are in working order, working TV's, pieces of furniture, picture frames, stools, chairs, etc. They cannot use clothing. The money will be sent directly to Indians and not through any service agency; therefore, insuring 100 per cent use of the money by those for whom the money was gathered.
