Alpha Sigma Alpha took top honors in the women's division, with Mary Barthel's finishing time of 1:18.493. The men's team of Lambda Chi Alpha was led by Kenny Zuber with a qualifying time of 1:07.517. DPMA EXPOSITION AT EXECUTIVE INN APRIL 25-27. The Region Nine Spring Conference and Exposition of Data Processing Management Association will be April 25-27 at the Executive Inn and Convention Center in Evansville. Ernest E. Nolan, assistant professor of business, has been appointed Exposition chairman, and will be working with companies throughout the tri-state in setting up exhibits of hardware, software, personal computers, and education-training materials. Professor Nolan will also act as a judge for the student paper competition on April 27, where students will compete for a \$1,000 scholarship to be awarded by Computer Personnel Service in Indianapolis, Indiana.

The Technology Keynote Address will be presented by George Isaacs, president of Isaacs and Associates of Chicago, and will focus on "merged technology systems." Edward Otting, director of corporate information systems and services at Eli Lilly and Company, and regent of the DPMA Education Foundation, will discuss "Preparing the DP Professional." The Management Keynote Address will be given by Eddie Ashmore, international secretary/treasurer of the DPMA. Seminars will be held on program modules, computer education, micro computer applications, DP applications, and management.

HUMANITIES FORUM PRESENTS GEORGE HITCHCOCK. The Humanities Forum Committee will sponsor a poetry reading by George Hitchcock, one of the most important figures in American literature during the last 35 years. Hitchcock has recently published The Wounded Alphabet: Poems Collected and New—1953-1983, with Jazz Press/PapaBach Editions.

In addition to publishing three collections of plays, ten volumes of poetry, a collection of short stories, and a novel, Hitchcock has edited two anthologies. His inspired editing of Kayak magazine has helped to make it one of the most renowned small press magazines published in America. Its pages have introduced and fostered the work of W. S. Merwin, Philip Levine, Charles Simic, Anne Sexton, and countless others. In the introduction to Hitchcock's Collected Poems, William Harmon said "What saves Hitchcock's poems from all those sorts of failure is his consistent freshness, as though every poem were his first..."

The reading will be Wednesday, April 24 at 11:00 a.m. in Forum One of the Administration Building. Everyone is invited.

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TWENTY-ONE INSTALLED IN PSI-CHI. Dr. Alan Carsrud, a licensed psychologist in the department of management, University of Texas at Austin, was on campus last week to install the charter of the Psi Chi National Honor Society, and to induct 21 persons from ISUE into its national membership. Granting of the charter was the highlight of the Tri-State Undergraduate Psychology Research Conference, which was held Saturday, April 14 in the University Center. Research papers were presented by undergraduate psychology students on a wide range of topics. Among the papers presented were "Dimensions of personality in young twins;" Herpes and rape: effects on punishment, responsibility, and personality;" and "Differences in eye-hand coordination of video-game users and non-users." The students had an opportunity to present their research in a format similar to regional and national psychology conventions. Last year, 27 papers were accepted for presentation by the Tri-State UPRC, six of which were research projects completed by ISUE students. Among the participating schools were IUPUI, SIU-Carbondale, Northern Kentucky University, University of Kentucky, Eastern Illinois University, Franklin College, Lindenwood College, Thomas More College, Hanover College, Washington University, Murray State, and Indiana Central.

PEOPLE IN THE NEWS. Dr. Robert E. Gehring, associate professor of psychology, was senior author of a paper presented to the Eastern Psychological Association in Baltimore April 14. "Incidental Memory for Video and Audio Events," dealt with learning and memory of college students for familiar types of activities. His experiment involved presentation of material in various methods. Some information was presented to the subjects in the form of standard informational lecture. Other information was shown in the form of silent pictorial lecture viewed from videotape. Subjects took accurate notes as they watched a mixed presentation of audio and video information. When presented with a free recall test two days after study, subjects' memory of the visual information was over five times the memory of the verbal information.

RECEPTION PLANNED FOR ART EXHIBIT. The opening reception of the Student Art Exhibition will be from 1:00 - 4:00 p.m. Sunday, April 22 in the University Center. The exhibition will be on display through April 30. Awards and scholarships will be presented to students at the reception, which will feature the best student work in painting, drawing, wood and metal sculpture, ceramics and print-making.

BOOK BY ISUE ARTISTS AT EVANSCVILLE MUSEUM. An exhibition of the art book by Michael Aakhus and Robert McDowell will be on display at the Evansville Museum of Arts and Sciences through May 14. The book will feature 10 poems and 10 three-color intaglio print illustrations from the hand-printed work entitled "History, Hardware, and Romance." The book includes poems and prints about the Ohio River bottomlands, a turn-of-the-century hardware store, and St. Meinrad Archabbey.
