ASSOCIATE DEGREE PROGRAMS IN ENGINEERING TECHNOLOGY. ISUE has received approval from the Indiana State University Board of Trustees to offer two-year Associate Degree Programs in Engineering Technology. One of the basic objectives of the program is to provide recognized associate degree programs in civil, electrical, mechanical, and mining technology, which may then be used toward a baccalaureate degree program.

The associate degree engineering technology programs have a number of strengths: they are diverse in structure, they are application oriented, they appeal to individuals who desire "hands-on" approach, they supply the needs for the nation's technical personpower projections, they provide an educational program with upward mobility as the main goal, they offer courses preparing the student to understand the technology which is responsible for our way of life, and they support many other technological activities.
