## 2. FINANCIAL AID DEPARTMENT (Correction of 11/2/70 Report)

Due to increased enrollment and also in part to the publicizing of the financial aid program at ISUE through meetings with high school counselors, students and parents, financial aid awarded to eligible students to date for this year already exceeds the amount awarded last year by approximately 40%.

We believe increased aid to deserving students particularly in our freshmen class will be a significant factor in raising our freshmen retention rate. For the present school year there are about thirteen (13) different types of grants, loans, scholarships and work-study aid in our program which were available to eligible qualified students.

There were twenty-two scholarships awarded by off-campus industries or social-civic organizations to students this year, which averaged about \$475 each. We could use and in fact need many more such scholarships. If anyone on our faculty or staff has knowledge of any off-campus organizations or industrial concerns who are contemplating offering scholarship aid to students, but who might need to be amenable to a little gentle persuasion to formulate their plans, our office would welcome the names of such prospects, and be glad to offer our assistance.
