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## SILVER ANNIVERSARY TO BE UNIVERSITY-WIDE OBSERVANCE

USI's Silver Anniversary observance September 10-15 will be a University-wide celebration, as students, faculty and staff, and alumni participate in events celebrating the first 25 years.

The major event will be the Silver Anniversary Gala dinner at 8 p.m. Saturday, September 25, in the Indiana Room at Robert E. Greene Convention Center. The keynote speaker will be **Mr. Charles McDowell**, newspaper columnist and public television panelist dealing with politics and presidential campaigns. His presentation is described as reminiscent of Will Rogers.

Tickets for the dinner are \$50 per person, which includes \$25 earmarked for the University's Presidential Scholarship program for Indiana valedictorians and salutatorians; corporations also may reserve a table for eight for \$1,000. Scholarship recipients will be among Gala celebrities.

Mr. McDowell's schedule also includes a luncheon with USI students, deans, and faculty chairs at 12 noon Saturday, and an appearance on Channel 9, which carries the *Washington Week in Review* program on which he is a frequent panelist.

Other 25th Anniversary observances will include a "Professional-in-Residence" series in which USI alumni will return to campus to discuss their careers and successes with current students, and several special events planned by student organizations. The series will include:

Barnett, Class of '81 (biology) and a faculty member at Harvard Medical School's Brigham and Women's Hospital, will meet with School of Science and Engineering Technology students at 1 p.m. in Forum III. He currently is working in the Division of Genetics at Harvard's Howard Hughes Medical Institute, learning molecular biology techniques to answer questions on cell communication and response. He investigates how heart cells in a developing chick embryo respond to environmental cues which cause the cells to migrate to their proper location.

Monday, September 10 -- Ms. Catherine Wheeler Jensen, Class of '78 (dental hygiene), will meet with School of Nursing and Health Professions students at 8 a.m. in UC350-352. She is an associate professor and coordinator of dental hygiene programs at Southern Illinois University's School of Technical Careers, Carbondale, where she was chosen 1988 Outstanding Teacher of the Year. She currently is working on her doctorate at SIU.

#### GERMAN REUNIFICATION LECTURE

Dr. Armin Bohnet, West German economics and finance professor at Justus-Liebig University GieBen, will discuss "German Reunification -- Hopes and Problems" in a public lecture at 7 p.m. Wednesday, August 29, in UC350. He will be the first speaker in the Silver Anniversary International Speakers series being offered this year at USI.

Dr. Bohnet is a member of the advisory group to West German Chancellor Helmut Kohl and has made exploring and consulting trips to the U.S., China, Japan, Chile, Colombia, and Venezuela. He will give a first-hand look at East German problems, discussing economic, monetary, and social reform and the transformation problems regarding competitiveness, privatization of state-owned companies, environmental destruction, and housing. He also will discuss repercussions on the West German economy and the impact of external relations of the two German states.

sor of Spanish, made a presentation May 16 at the Tenth Cincinnati Conference on Romance Languages and Literature on the acquisition of Spanish gender by college students. Another paper, "Semantically Transparent Surnames in Spanish," appeared in the Romance Language Annual 1989 (Vol. I, pp. 505-510). The journal, Hispania. will publish Dr. Latorre's letter advocating more frequent use of Spanish in Hispanic studies in the U.S. in its September 1990 issue. He also read a paper on the syntax of Spanish unipersonal constructions at the 72nd annual meeting of the American Association of Teachers of Spanish and Portuguese, held August 10-14 in Miami.

Dr. Joseph J. Palladino, chair of the Psychology Department and president-elect of Division II, American Psychological Association, has received APA's 1990 Teaching Excellence Award, presented for "his commitment to teaching, his development of regional conferences for teachers of psychology, his contributions to the literature on teaching, and his encouragement of colleagues to develop and disseminate teaching methods and techniques." He also noted that Dr. Palladino holds the rare distinction of receiving the APA award the first year he was nominated.
