Tickets, please!

The tragedy of Sophocles' classic *Oedipus* meets the comedy of Neil Simon's updated *Odd Couple* in a USI Theatre season that also includes a free American College Theatre Festival production for subscribers.

For the first time, USI Theatre is offering patrons the opportunity to purchase season tickets. In addition to a discount on USI's four 2001-2002 shows, people purchasing season subscriptions will receive a free pass to one of six productions showcased in the regional college theatre festival the University will host in January.

Opening Wednesday, October 17, the USI season will begin with *Oedipus*. *Sprint Scenes*, a selection of short performances directed by students, will be performed in December, followed by *The Odd Couple: The Female Version* in February. The season will conclude in April with David Rabe's *In the Boom Boom Room*. (Note: *In the Boom Boom Room* includes adult language and content.)

With the exception of *Sprint Scenes*, University productions will be staged at the USI Theatre on

Igleheart Avenue. *Sprint Scenes* will be performed at the Helen Mallette Studio Theatre in the Liberal Arts Center.

Productions in the 2002 Region III American College Theatre Festival will be presented at The Centre in downtown Evansville. The festival competition will feature entries from colleges and universities in Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, and Wisconsin. Students will display their skill in acting, design, playwriting, directing, and criticism.

The subscription price – for four USI shows and a free festival pass - is \$27 for adults, \$21 for senior citizens 60 and older or students younger than 18, and \$9 for USI students. Season tickets will be available until Tuesday, October 16.

"Subscriptions enable theatre patrons in the community and on campus to see the productions at a reduced price," said **Mr. Steven Renner**, USI Theatre managing director. "They are offered the best seats with no waiting in line."

The individual ticket price for USI productions is \$9 for adults, \$7 for senior citizens/students, and \$3 for USI students.

Speaker to address leadership, service

Feeling tired, frustrated, or totally overwhelmed? One of the country's leading experts in the field of student development and self-motivation will deliver an inspirational service leadership program to faculty and staff Thursday, October 11.

Mr. Joe Martin, professor at West Florida University, will present "Give and Grow Rich" from 9 to 11 a.m. in Carter Hall. His program is designed to teach people how to lead, motivate, and inspire others by serving.

Participants will learn how to unlock the secret of staying motivated, accept responsibility for personal and professional development, and discover that work can be a blessing not a burden.

Raised in one of the toughest inner-city ghettos in Miami, Florida, Martin is a product of his own message. He graduated at the top of his university class at the age of 20. He started his first business at 22 and became the youngest professor ever hired to teach at a state university in Florida at 24.

He is the founder and president of RealWorld University – a student success resource center. Martin also has worked as a sales trainer for a Fortune 500 company and as a public relations professional for both the state and federal governments. He is the author of two books, *Tricks of the Grade* and *This Little Light of Mine*, and he has written more than 100 articles for more than 20 publications.


The USI Chamber Choir will perform at 11 a.m., followed by brunch in The Loft.



USI Center will offer depression screening

National Depression Screening Day will be observed Thursday, October 11, and the University Counseling Center plans to participate again this year. Center staff will conduct screenings from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. in the University Center, rooms 201 and 202.

USI family, staff, and students are invited to view a 20-minute video, complete a short questionnaire, and meet privately with a Counseling Center staff member to discuss the results.

Screening provides an opportunity to determine the presence or absence of depressive symptoms but does not constitute a diagnosis or second opinion. If appropriate, participants will receive a referral for further evaluation. Some statistics related to depression include:

- Major depressive disorder affects approximately 9.9 million American adults, about 5 percent of the U.S. population age 18 and older in a given year.

- Americans ages 15 to 24 are more likely to experience a mental illness than any other age group.

- Manic-depression affects approximately 2.3 million American adults, about 1.2 percent of the U.S. population age 18 and older in a given year.

- The suicide rate in young people has increased dramatically during the last few decades. Suicide was the third-leading cause of death among 15 to 24 year olds and the second-leading cause of death on college campuses.

- A poll following the terrorist attacks September 11 reported that as a result of those events, 75% of Americans have felt depressed; nearly 50% have had difficulty concentrating; and 33% are having trouble sleeping.

Gallery exhibit opening

Ms. Caroline Kahler, associate professor of art at Bethany College, and **Ms. Tanja Softic**, associate professor of art at University of Richmond, will exhibit their work at the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art Saturday, September 29, through Saturday, November 10. A reception for the artists will be held from 5 to 7 p.m. Saturday, September 29.

Kahler will display ceramic sculptures featuring imaginative organic objects with the properties of living organisms that might or might not exist in the natural world. Her pieces are metaphors for the life cycle. She received an M.A. from Purdue University and an M.F.A. from Wichita State University.

Softic's works on paper feature a biomorphic world of natural forms and shapes suggesting vessels, shells, pods, flowers, and plants. She works with layers, tones, and muted deep colors to create environments that encompass life's beginning and its end.

Born in Sarajevo, Bosnia, she received a B.F.A. at the Academy of Fine Arts, University of Sarajevo. She earned an M.F.A. at Old Dominion University/Norfolk State University.



Web tips

USI's Web site redesign was completed last week. The template Web Services created will work in Netscape and Internet Explorer versions 4.0 and above.

The practice of copying text from MSWord and pasting it directly into FrontPage can cause a problem. Although these two software programs are supposed to be compatible, when text is copied directly from MSWord, extraneous code is inserted into the document as it is pasted into FrontPage, which corrupts the page.

Often, such pages appear to work, and the content developer is unaware of the junk code in the document unless it is displayed on the html screen in FrontPage. These pages, however, may become disabled when a document is edited or changed, which occurred in the conversion process.

When attempting to change font sizes or type styles, or otherwise move or edit text, campus content developers have found commands do not work or do not work the way they intended.

A page may appear fine in FrontPage's normal view but will not display properly in the browser (Netscape or Internet Explorer). The text in the middle of a paragraph may appear in a different font or as a different size, and tables may not display properly.

A simple solution is to copy the text from MSWord and paste it into Notepad, which will strip out all the code. Then copy the plain text from Notepad and paste it into the FrontPage document. The additional step takes no more than 20 seconds. Once the text is in FrontPage, content developers may format it, adding bold, italics, and hyperlinks.
