EN'S BASKETBALL OUTLOOK

BUILDING A TRADITION OF EXCELLENCE

The 1995-96 season will mark a first for the University of Southern Indiana men's basketball team. It will be defending the University's first National Championship in men's basketball.

The 1994-95 championship season can only be described as "incredible." Despite finishing third in the Great Lakes Valley Conference, the Screaming Eagles rolled into the NCAA II Tournament like a juggernaut.

USI won its second straight Great Lakes Regional title, defeating number three ranked Kentucky Wesleyan College and number nine ranked Northern Kentucky University in Cincinnati, Ohio. The title advanced USI to the NCAA II Elite Eight for a second consecutive season.

In the Elite Eight, the Eagles arrived with the attitude that they were going to win it all after falling short in the 1994 championship games. USI screamed out of the gate, defeating New Hampshire College in the opening round, 108-93, and held on in the final four to down 12th ranked Norfolk State University, 89-81, and advance to its second successive national championship game.

USI got out to a slow start in the championship against the University of California-Riverside, trailing by 22 points in the first ten minutes. The squad fought back, inching closer and closer, taking the lead with 1:37. The team out-scored UCR, 12-1, in the final minute to win its first **NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP**.

Entering the 1995-96 season, the Eagles will be attempting to do something no program in the history of Division II college basketball has ever done—play in three consecutive national championship games. It will be a tremendous challenge for this experienced team.

Directing this veteran squad is Head Coach **Bruce Pearl**, who was named the NABC Division II Coach of the Year in 1995. Pearl is the winningest active college basketball coach in the country with a winning percentage of .840 (79-15), ranking second at USI in career wins. He needs just 32 victories to become USI's all-time leader in wins.

"Having never won a national championship before, I've never been faced with the challenge of trying to repeat," said Pearl. "Our conference is loaded again and Division II basketball across the nation might be as strong as it's ever been. We've got our work cut out for us."

Pearl will not be without weapons in the title defense, returning four starters and seven reserves. Pearl said, "We are talented and deep at every position and we are an experienced team. How well the returning players and newcomers work together will determine the outcome of the season."

Leading the way is the NABC Division II Player of the Year in 6-5 senior forward **Stan Gouard** (Danville, Ill.). The first team All-American led the Eagles with 18.9 ppg and 8.8 rpg. Gouard, a preseason All-America candidate, set the USI single season record for points (623) and steals (66) last season.

In 11 NCAA Tournament games over two seasons, Gouard, who was named 1995 preseason Player of the Year by *Dick Vitale's Basketball Magazine*, *Division II Bulletin*, and *The Sporting News*, has averaged 17.0 ppg and 8.0 rpg with 21 steals, 10 blocks, and 29 assists.

Joining Gouard in the frontcourt will be the NCAA II Great Lakes Regional Most Outstanding Player and Elite Eight All-Tournament performer **Chad Gilbert** (Charlestown, Ind.), a 6-9 senior forward. Gilbert, named preseason All-American by *Dick Vitale's Basketball Magazine* and *The Sporting News*, came into his own in the NCAA Tournament, averaging 20.0 ppg and 9.3 rpg.

In the three Great Lakes Regional games, he averaged 25.3 ppg, shooting 73.0 percent (27/37) from the field, and 9.3 rpg. Gilbert put up 15.8 ppg and 6.7 rpg for the season.

Returning for their senior seasons in the frontcourt are 6-5 forward

Scott Boyden (Evansville, Ind.) and 6-8 forward **Neil Coyle** (Campbellsville, Ind.). Both spent most of 1994-95 in the post position.

Boyden, who started 20 of the 33 games and shot .631 (140/222), averaged 10.8 ppg, 3.6 rpg, and with 64 steals, falling two short of Gouard and the school record. Coyle, whose five starts came in the NCAA Tournament, averaged 6.8 ppg and 3.3 rpg in 25 games last year.

Off the bench in the frontcourt, the Eagles will return 6-5 junior forward **Joel Thomas** (Evansville, Ind.), 2.4 ppg and 2.2 rpg in 22 games, and 6-6 sophomore forward **Tim Tooley** (Huntingburg, Ind.) 1.3 ppg and 1.0 rpg in 28 games. Also returning to the team will be 6-5 junior forward **Scott Taylor** (East Moline, Ill.) and sophomore **Grant Childers** (Newburgh, Ind.), who were redshirted last year.

Returning in the backcourt is 6-2 junior guard **Marc Hostetter** (Lyons, Ind.). Hostetter, a point guard, filled the shoes of All-American Tyrone Tate quite well in 1994-95 averaging 5.8 ppg and 4.5 assists. In the NCAA Tournament, Hostetter averaged 11.8 ppg and 4.5 assists, knocking down big shots and taking control of the team.

Returning to join Hostetter in the backcourt off the bench is 6-1 senior guard **Larry Eady** and 6-2 junior guard **Shawn Aldridge**. Eady, who played in 33 games and averaged 5.0 ppg and 1.5 assists, has the ability to penetrate on offense and put pressure on the defense. Aldridge, who came back last year after sitting out 1993-94 with an injury, averaged 2.2 ppg and 1.1 ppg in 26 games.

After winning a national championship with out a true center, the Eagles have picked up a pure post player for the position in 1995-96 in 6-10 junior center **Jason Dominick**, a transfer from the University of North Carolina-Charlotte. Dominick played in nine games off the bench for Charlotte last year.

USI was pleased to tap into the fertile recruiting grounds of Vincennes University and land 6-8 junior forward **Brad Chapman**, who was named the *Dick Vitale's College Basketball* Preseason Newcomer of the Year. Joining the Trailblazers at the semester break, Chapman averaged 11.4 ppg and 7.5 rpg last season.

Also new to the team in the frontcourt is **Andy Swan** (Evansville, Ind.), a 6-8 center.

New to the backcourt is a senior, a junior and two freshmen. Transferring to USI from the University of Tennessee is **Chris Brand** (Bloomington, Ind.) and from Eastern Illinois University **Johnny Moore**, a 6-2 junior guard. Entering USI as freshmen guards are 6-3 **Ryan Kelley** and 5-10 **Ryan Luce** (Clinton, Ind.).

Moore, who averaged 12.6 ppg and 3.1 rpg in 1994-95 for EIU, led the Mid-Continent Conference in three-point field goal percentage, hitting 45 percent (46/103). He also set an Eastern Illinois single game record for free throw percentage, hitting 11/11 against Youngstown State.

To win a second straight national championship, the Eagles will have to replace two valuable losses from the title squad.

Gone is the Great Lakes Regional and Elite Eight All-Tournament performer Brian Huebner, who averaged 14.7 ppg to lead the team in the Elite Eight, and the CBS/Chevrolet Most Valuable Player of the championship game Cortez Barnes, who averaged 14.9 ppg last year.


The path to a second national championship leads through the GLVC. The league, which as always features tough conference rivals such as Kentucky Wesleyan College and Northern Kentucky University, will be even stiffer competition for the Eagles in 1995-96 with the addition of Southern Illinois University at Edwardsville, Quincy University, an NCAA Tournament team last year, and the University of Wisconsin-Parkside.

"We play in the toughest conference in all of Division II basketball which was well documented with three top-ten teams in the (Great Lakes) regional. It will not be easy to get back to Louisville," said Pearl.



MEN'S COACHING STAFF

USI HEAD COACH BRUCE PEARL



In three seasons Bruce Pearl has brought the USI men's basketball program into the NCAA Division II's elite. Pearl's teams have a record of 79-15 (.840), making him the winningest active coach in America.

In 1994-95, Pearl, the NABC National Coach of the Year, led the Screaming Eagles to the University's first NCAA Division II National Championship. Pearl's Eagles, who returned five players and had seven newcomers, also captured their second straight Great Lakes Regional championship, finished the regular season ranked fifth nationally, and had a 29-4 overall record.

Over the three years, Pearl, who at 35 is considered by many to be one of the brightest young coaches in the nation, has coached two players named national Player of the Year; four players named All-American; one player named Great Lakes Valley Conference Player of the Year; three players named GLVC Newcomer of the Year; and three players named first team All-GLVC.

In 1993-94 Pearl directed the Eagles to their best season in school history (28-4) and finished the regular season ranked ninth. The Eagles earned a GLVC championship (16-2), a Great Lakes Regional championship, and played as a finalist in the NCAA II championship game. Pearl became only the second coach in GLVC history to be named conference Coach of the Year in two straight seasons, and reached 50 wins faster than any coach in USI history.

In his initial season, Pearl led the Screaming Eagles to a 22-7 record, a second-place finish in the Great Lakes Valley Conference with a 14-4 record, a berth in the NCAA Division II tournament, a final regular season rank of 11th, and received his first GLVC Coach of the Year award in 1993. The success of the team in 1992-93 was the biggest turn around in GLVC history after inheriting a squad which finished 10-18 overall, 4-14 GLVC, in 1991-92.

Pearl, who also serves as coordinator of athletic development at USI, has spurred unparalleled growth in scholarship contributions to the Varsity Club. This fan support has revived basketball enthusiasm at the PAC.

Attendance is at an all-time high as the Eagles expect to SELL OUT half of the GLVC schedule.

Prior to coming to USI, Pearl was an assistant coach at the University of Iowa, where he was responsible for implementing full-court pressure defensive tactics. He was also responsible for the performance of Iowa's inside players, particularly the offensive and defensive post players. Coach Pearl taught many current pro basketball players, including Brad Lohaus (San Antonio Spurs), Acie Earl (Toronto Raptors), B.J. Armstrong (Golden State Warriors), Kevin Gamble (Miami Heat), and Matt Bullard (Houston Rockets).

During Pearl's six-year stay at Iowa, the Hawkeyes received five tournament berths, one final eight appearance (1987), one final 16 appearance (1988), and placed eight players in the National Basketball Association. While at Iowa, Pearl helped head coach Dr. Tom Davis to a 129-63 record. For his efforts, Pearl was recognized in 1988 as one of the top Division I assistants in the country by *Basketball Weekly*.


In leaving Iowa Pearl ended 14 years as an assistant and right-hand man to Dr. Davis. Prior to joining Davis at Iowa, Pearl was Davis' assistant coach (1982-83) and an associate head coach (1983-86) at Stanford University. As an undergraduate, Pearl was Davis' administrative assistant at Boston College (1978-82).

Pearl received his bachelor's degree in business administration from Boston College in 1982, graduating cum laude. He is working toward a master's degree at Iowa.

Pearl and his wife Kim have two daughters, Jacqui and Leah, and two sons, Steven and Michael.



ASSISTANT COACH RICK HERDES




Rick Herdes enters his fourth season at USI as Coach Pearl's top assistant coach. Herdes is considered to be one of the best recruiters in Division II basketball. This year's recruits are no exception. He also directs scouting and the highly successful Southern Indiana Summer Basketball Camps. Herdes came to USI from Southern Illinois University at Edwardsville, where he was an assistant from 1986 to 1992. While at SIUE, Herdes helped Head Coach Larry Graham lead the Cougars to a 127-56 record and three NCAA tournament appearances. He was responsible for coordinating on- and off-campus recruiting. He also was academic advisor to the basketball team and director of summer camps and fund-raising events. In 1991 and 1992 at SIUE, he was the head coach for the Illinois Prairie State Games, Southern Open Men's Division. His 1992 team received the silver medal. Prior to working at SIUE, Herdes was an assistant basketball coach and physical education instructor at Lawrenceville (Ill.) High School, where he worked for current Indiana University assistant coach Ron Felling. LHS was the Illinois Class A State Champion in 1982 and 1983 and had a 68-game winning streak. Herdes graduated from Graceland College in 1980 with a bachelor's degree in education. He is completing a master's degree in secondary education at USI. As a player, Herdes led Lincoln Trail College to a ninth-place finish in the national tournament and helped lead Graceland to its first-ever appearance in the NAIA Tournament.

PEARL on Herdes: "I am very fortunate to have Rick Herdes as my top assistant. He came to USI with a recommendation from Bob Knight and a wealth of experience in Division II. He is loyal, hard working, and the kind of person I want at my side. "Rick was responsible for my quick transition to Division II basketball. His contacts in this region made him a highly effective recruiter and he is one of the best camp directors with whom I have ever worked. He is preparing himself to be a tremendous head coach."


RON FELLING, Assistant Basketball Coach at Indiana University on Herdes:

GRADUATE ASSISTANT COACH KENO DAVIS





ABOUT THE UNIVERSITY OF SOUTHERN INDIANA

The University of Southern Indiana endeavors to improve access to higher education and to serve the economic, intellectual, and cultural needs of southern Indiana. Established in 1965, the University of Southern Indiana serves over 7,650 students, of which 90 percent are from Indiana.

USI is located seven miles west of downtown Evansville. The natural beauty of the University is a significant feature of the campus. Located on 300 acres of gently rolling hills, the University has seven main buildings.

Academic programs in over 60 majors are offered in the School of Business, the School of Education and Human Services, the School of Liberal Arts, the School of Science and Engineering Technology, and the School of Nursing and Health Professions.

The University of Southern Indiana grants Bachelor of Arts (B.A.), Bachelor of Occupation and General Studies (B.O.G.S.), Bachelor of Science (B.S.), Bachelor of Science in Nursing (B.S.N.), and Bachelor of Social Work (B.S.W.) degrees at the undergradu-

ate level. Several of the schools offer associate degrees for two or three years of full-time study. Graduate students may work toward a master's degree in business administration, education, industrial management, liberal studies, or social work.

Through the Office of Continuing Education, USI offers seminars, workshops, short courses, and customized and in-house programs. The topic range includes business/professional development, Total Quality Management, fitness/wellness/recreation, arts and leisure, personal interest, programs for children, and travel/study programs.

Housing is available in McDonald Apartments and O'Daniel Apartments on campus. Over 1,500 students live in the apartments.

USI sponsors 12 intercollegiate sports—men's baseball, basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, and tennis and women's basketball, softball, cross country, golf, volleyball, and tennis—in the Great Lakes Valley Conference of the NCAA Division II competition. Women's soccer will be added in fall of 1996.
