## Date rape victim to speak at USI

Ms. Katie Koestner, a victim of date rape while a freshman at the College of William and Mary who has been a leader in bringing the issue to public debate, will speak at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, October 23, in Mitchell Auditorium. The program is sponsored by USI Student Life and the Sexual Assault Prevention Task Force, and is open to the University community and the public.

Ms. Koestner's story has been reported across the country via newspaper and television, including the HBO docudrama *No Visible Bruises: the Katie Koestner Story*. Her assailant was a young man she had been dating for three weeks. Partly as a result of her outcry, the college rewrote its policy toward date rape to make sure victims get the advice and counseling they need.

Ms. Koestner graduated from William and Mary in 1994 and has continued to travel the country, speaking at more than 250 schools in 30 states with a goal of making as much of an impact as possible

while she is still young enough to be a "peer." Ms. Koestner is a Virginia State-trained and certified peer educator and sexual assault counselor. She is recognized as an expert at helping schools develop model response programs for dealing with campus sexual assault. From medical assistance to training campus officials to adjudicate at hearings, she has developed a response coordination system that shows how to provide victims with the support they need at a time of crisis and to deal administratively with incidents of rape and harassment of students on campus.

Ms. Koestner earned degrees in Public Policy and Women's Studies, magna cum laude and Phi Beta Kappa. She has put off graduate school plans so she can present her program, "No/Yes." She has found it is much more effective to talk to students directly about proactively preventing rape. For information on the USI program, call Debra L.
