Chemistry Laboratory Supervisor

Responsibilities include maintenance of biology inventory, routine electrical and optical repairs, maintenance of biological instruments, and supervision of student workers; will make preparations and setups for laboratory instruction in some biology labs, especially the bacteriological labs for nurses and certain lower levels. B.S. degree in biology/bacteriology required; M.S. preferred; must be trained in bacteriological techniques and the maintenance of live cultures; must have excellent communication skills; computer knowledge desired.

Position description: Temporary position available at University pool, approximately 20 to 30 hours per week, until September 15; individual will coordinate daily pool activities, schedule guards, and maintain cleanliness of pool area; must have advanced lifesaving certificate or WSI, with a course in lifeguarding preferred; previous lifeguard experience required.
