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USI extending enrollment, tuition-free, to students displaced by Katrina

University of Southern Indiana **President H. Ray Hoops** announced today that USI will extend to students displaced by Hurricane Katrina the opportunity to enroll tuition-free for one semester at USI. The enrollment opportunity will extend through close of business Wednesday, September 7. Classes have been underway at USI since Monday, August 29.

"We will have staff on call through the holiday weekend to expedite the enrollment process for any students who are unable to take classes at their home campus this fall. We want to assist these storm victims in continuing their academic pursuits, whether they are undergraduate or graduate students," President Hoops said. The tuition waiver applies to both Indiana residents and out-of-state residents.

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Southern Hospitality Days introduce students and families to USI

Shannon Hile, senior admissions counselor, has no doubt that Southern Hospitality Days, the University's visitation program, is important for recruitment. "It's very important, because over 80 percent of students who participate attend USI," she said.

Southern Hospitality Days are held on four Saturdays during the fall and spring semesters. The next will be Saturday, September 24. **Robert Parent**, vice president for Student Affairs, will welcome students that day. Other faculty and staff have performed that role in the past. That part of the program takes place in either Carter Hall or Mitchell Auditorium.

Later, students are introduced to residence life and student life, the academic colleges, honors programs, scholarship opportunities, etc., in classrooms in the Health Professions and Science and Education centers.

Student ambassadors give attendees a walking tour of the campus, after which they have the opportunity to go to financial aid sessions. "That's optional, but we strongly encourage students and their families to attend those sessions," Hile said.

After a complimentary lunch in the Eagles Nest, students and their families are given a housing tour. "They get to see both styles of housing, the residence halls and the apartments. METS transportation takes them over to both," Hile said.

"During that time we have an information fair in which we strongly encourage clubs and organizations to participate, so they can provide information to prospective students about the different things in which students can get involved."

Attendees also meet with admission and financial aid counselors, and the USI Bookstore gives them discounts on clothing.

Hile said prospective students' typical questions involve cost,

scholarships, average class size, majors, clubs and organizations, and athletics. They also want to know if they can have cars on campus. (All USI students, including freshmen, can.)

Prospective students find the suites in the residence halls attractive, in part because the rooms are air conditioned and two residents share one bath; each suite has two bedrooms, two baths, and a shared lounge area for four students. Students also find USI's tuition attractive in comparison to other state institutions.

Fall 2005 Southern Hospitality Days are September 24, October 15, October 29, and November 19. Spring Southern Hospitality Days are February 4, February 25, March 25, and April 8.

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Faust's film features USI faculty and staff

Nick Faust, adjunct instructor in theatre, spent his summer making a horror movie.

Faust, who teaches Acting I and Introduction to Theatre, produced and directed "Symbiotica," his third film, on location in Evansville. It features performances by USI faculty and staff, and members of the community. Faust's long-time collaborator, Joe Goodrich, wrote the script.

Faust taught at USI in the mid-90s and directed a production of "Mad Forest" for USI Theatre. For the last decade, he has lived in New Orleans, where he owned a video store and taught at Tulane University. He returned to Evansville for the purpose of shooting his film.

"Symbiotica" is about a Pulitzer-prize winning playwright who learns a terrible secret about her past as she is cleaning out her late father's home. "Kate is tormented, discovering horrible, traumatic things about herself," Faust said.

Seattle-based performance artist Vanessa Skantze plays Kate and Bob Porch, a graduate of the University of Evansville, plays her husband, Ben.

Members of the USI community appearing in the film include **Elliot Wasserman**, director of USI Theatre, **Doug Hubbell**, associate professor of theatre, **Wendy Knipe Bredhold**, writer in News and Information Services, and **Jolie McCraw DeVries '98**.

Faust and his director of photography, Jason Matherne, shot in locations all over Evansville, including Faust's Crystal Court home, University of Evansville's Shanklin Theatre, The Book Broker, Buy Low, and Holy Spirit Catholic Church. **Shan Jensen**, costume designer for New Harmony Theatre, is art director for the film.

Faust and Matherne, who runs a film company in New Orleans called Terror Optics, had been discussing the project for two years. "Jason is completely self-taught, and is brilliant at this," Faust said. "I've learned a great deal from him and maybe he learned something from my directing experience. If that's the

only thing that comes out of the whole experience, then it's worth it."

Faust would like to use "Symbiotica" to promote Evansville as a movie-making destination. "I can make a low budget feature here for an amount of money that would buy me a week in Los Angeles," he said. "In Evansville, I have a lot more time."

"Regional filmmaking is the next new wave. Digital and home editing have demystified the process, so anybody can make a movie. Regional filmmaking will be to Hollywood what regional theater is to Broadway."

He has no specific plans for the film once it is finished. "I hope that I can show someone what I've done on a low budget in Evansville with a modicum of style, characters, drama, and good performances."

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Darrell is director of Humanities

Sherry Darrell, professor of English, assumed the position of director of Humanities in August, succeeding **Dine Moeller-Sahling**, assistant professor of German.

"Sherry is no stranger to the Humanities program and her involvement can be traced to its initial development at USI, and its incorporation into the University core curriculum," said **David Glassman**, dean of the College of Liberal Arts. "Sherry brings strong leadership skills and experience to the program. I know she will be a tireless advocate for its recognition of excellence on campus, and its importance in the University experience."

Darrell joined the University as a part-time assistant professor of English in 1975 and became full time in 1978. She also has served USI as Academic Skills coordinator, Honors Day coordinator, and inauguration writer, as well as founding sponsor of Alpha Chi Honorary.

An Owensboro resident, she is the recipient of a Faculty Research and Creative Work Grant, an Alumni Association Faculty Recognition Award, a Kentucky Women's Foundation Grant, and a National Endowment for the Humanities summer seminar in Greek tragedy at Dartmouth College.

She is an active writer and board member for Hospice and Palliative Care of the Ohio Valley in Owensboro and teaches an adult Sunday school class with her husband at Trinity United Methodist Church in Evansville.

Darrell holds a Ph.D. and M.A. from George Peabody College for Teachers, Vanderbilt University; and a B.A. in English and philosophy from McMurry College.

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New group connects parents and families to USI

"We formed the association to improve communications between parents, families, and the University," said **Trisha Kennedy**, assistant director of Alumni and Volunteer Services. All parents and families can be members, but those who contribute \$25 annually are considered active members.

"To be on the council you have to be an active member, but we want to be open to all family members, past and present. Parents are a resource for the University. There are many different ways they can support and work with the University," Kennedy said.
