### EVENING STUDENT ASSISTANCE CENTER OPENS. An evening student assistance center has been established to provide improved service to students who attend ISUE in the evenings. The center will be operated

on an experimental basis to provide information and assistance not now available to evening students including referral for services that can not be performed at the center in the evening. The center is

located in the foyer between the Student Services and Business Offices and is open from 4:30 to 6:00 p.m. on all evenings that classes are scheduled (Monday through Thursday). It is staffed on a rotating basis by administrative personnel. Informational pamphlets and appropriate forms are available at the center; any offices with information to disseminate to evening students should send that information to the Office of the President with appropriate instructions for the staff of the center.

In conjunction with this effort, many of the academic divisions have established regular evening hours when academic advisors are available in the divisions to assist students with scheduling and advising difficulties.

The cooperation of all university personnel is requested in informing evening students of this service available to them. Questions about the center should be directed to Dr. M. Edward Jones, Director of Continuing Education (extension 1863).

MUSEUM MEMBERSHIP DRIVE ON CAMPUS. The Evansville Museum has started a membership drive this month and within the next several weeks University employees will be invited to become members or to renew their membership in the Museum.

Mary Lou Shane, chairman of the Museum Board's membership committee says the goal is to gain 1,000 members in the individual or family categories. Individual memberships are \$8.00 and family memberships \$15.00 a year. Membership contributions are used to help support the Museum's budget, thereby directly assisting in continuing the Museum's excellent services to the community. Benefits of membership are:

PREVIEWS. Invitation to previews of new exhibitions, Members Lectures, and other functions, such as the Annual Members Fourth of July Celebration.

PUBLICATIONS. Regular mailings and Bulletins as well as a complimentary copy of the new Evansville Museum Visitors Guide and 1980 Exhibition Schedule.

MUSEUM GUILD. Eligibility for membership in the Museum Guild.

MUSEUM SHOP. Eligibility for a 10% discount on purchases of \$5.00 or more at the Museum Shop.

CLASSES. Tuition discounts to classes offered by the Museum. Also discount for member's children in classes and pre-school classes.

MEMBERS ROOM and LIBRARY. Use of the Museum's handsome new Members Room with its magnificent panoramic view of the Ohio River and access to the extensive Reference Library is a privilege of Museum Membership.

MUSEUM MEMBERSHIP DRIVE (CONTINUED). Being a member also gives the satisfaction of supporting a cultural force of value to all adults, artists, students, and school children in the Evansville area.

Eighty thousand people visited the Museum in the first ten months of 1979, and since its founding over 50 years ago it has been a free public museum. Such visible support is heartening, but the museum needs members to maintain the quality of the services they provide.

ISU FEDERAL CREDIT UNION. The Credit Union is offering a new 30-Month Certificate. The new 30 month  $(2\frac{1}{2}$  year) certificate will offer a floating interest rate tied to the yield on Treasury securities that also mature in  $2\frac{1}{2}$  years. Credit unions will have a ceiling rate 0.5% below the Treasury rate. The interest ceiling will be established monthly for new deposits, based on the rate announced by Treasury three business days before the beginning of each month.

The ISU Federal Credit Union has established a minimum of \$1,000 with increments of \$500 - compounded daily - paid quarterly. Substantial penalty for early withdrawal.

- PLAN A SPRING TRIP. The French Quarter of New Orleans with its narrow streets, iron balconies, outdoor markets, sidewalk artists and all that Jazz is the destination of the New Orleans History and Gourmet Tour sponsored by ISUE.

According to tour director DR. JAMES BLEVINS, the trip will be an opportunity to experience the Old World flavor that still pervades the city's customs, architecture and food. The four-day tour, scheduled during the public schools' Spring break, March 29 through April 1, includes a guided tour of New Orleans and lodging in the historic French Quarter where shopping and museums are easily accessible.

The registration fee of \$347.00 includes plane fare, transportation to hotel, New Orleans historic tour, three nights lodging in a double occupancy room in the French Quarter, and a New Orleans information packet.

Although meal costs are additional, particpants may enjoy the cuisine at two legendary New Orleans restaurants -- breakfast at Brennan's and dinner at Antoine's. Time will be available for side trips such as an excursion to the authentic Southern plantations still in operation. New Orleans is a 24-hour town that is as active at 4:00 a.m. as it is at 2:00 in the afternoon.

PEOPLE IN THE NEWS. BARBARA T. BROTHERS recently attended a boiler efficiency improvement seminar at the L.A. Pittenger Student Center held January 9 and 10, 1980 at the Ball State University campus - co-sponsored by the University of Auburn and the School of Continuing Education of Ball State University.

The instructional effort was directed toward fuel conservation and cost effectiveness by existing facilities. Based on sound combustion theory, the course taught by Auburn University engineering professors prepared the 51 participants from colleges, school corporations and businesses with practical cost cutting ideas which they could begin to put into practice the next day.
