Ted Ziemer receives honorary degree

USI conferred an honorary Doctor of Laws degree on prominent attorney Ted Ziemer in recognition of his civic leadership, which includes long-time service on the USI Foundation Board of Directors. The conferral took place at the USI Foundation President's Associates dinner on Wednesday, September 2 in Carter Hall.

A senior partner in the law firm of Ziemer, Stayman, Weitzel, and Shoulders, Mr. Ziemer has practiced law in Evansville since 1962. During his legal career, he has been active in committees of the local, state, and national bar groups and served on the board of the Indiana State Bar Foundation.

Mr. Ziemer is a permanent board member of the Evansville Chamber of Commerce, the Southwest Indiana Public Broadcasting Corporation, Evansville Museum of Arts and Sciences, and United Way. He has served as chair of each of these organizations.

The President's Associates are USI's most generous donors. Annual members give at least \$1,000 a year and perpetual members make a single gift of \$25,000 or more.

Robert E. Griffin, the chair of the USI Foundation Board of Directors, recognized 26 new perpetual members during the dinner. He also acknowledged 138 associates who are members of the USI faculty and staff and their spouses.

The President's Associates was established by the USI Foundation in 1987 and 138 members joined the first year. Contributions provide support for student scholarships, faculty research and development, and a variety of academic, athletic, and student enrichment programs.

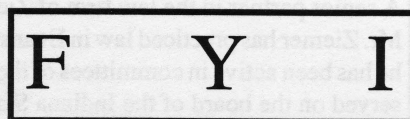
Kathy Moorman

Handling University cash:

Pursuant to the directive of the University president, **Dr. H. Ray Hoops**, the only authorized agent to control, account for, and safeguard cash at the University of Southern Indiana is the Business Office. Specifically, this office is responsible for collecting fees and other income, making all fee refunds, preparing bank deposits, issuing petty cash disbursements, issuing change funds to authorized units, and assessing student fees.

Under no circumstances is an employee to accept money in the name of the University without properly recording the income with an official University receipt. A receipt will be issued by the Cashier's Office for all cash received, except for cash received by approved satellite operations.

Departments that have been approved to accept money are required to issue receipts and make daily deposits. These departments are responsible for maintain their own receipt subsidiary record on forms that have been approved by the controller.

Loss of any funds should be reported IMMEDIATELY to the Cashier's Office and to the University Security Department. Questions on cash control procedures should be addressed to the bursar, ext. 1842.

ACLS Fellowships are for postdoctoral research in the humanities and humanities-related social sciences. Also available are the ACLS/New York Public Library Center for Scholars and Writers Residential Fellowships.

- ACLS/SSRC International Postdoctoral Fellowships for postdoctoral research in the humanities and humanities-related social sciences on the societies and cultures of Asia, Latin America and the Caribbean, or sub-Saharan Africa.
- Contemplative Practice Fellowships for academic faculty members to develop courses and teaching materials that explore contemplative practice from a variety of disciplinary and interdisciplinary perspectives.
- Henry Luce Foundation/ACLS Dissertation Fellowship Program in American Art for Ph.D. dissertation work in the art history of the United States in any period.
