Indiana Bell is surveying Evansville residents to determine whether the New Harmony exchange should be added to Evansville's local calling area. In a survey of New Harmony customers this summer, 68 percent who returned a ballot voted for the service. Approval now by Evansville customers would ensure that this service could be added.

For Evansville customers, it would mean a nickel more per month for residential customers and fifteen cents more per month for businesses. After five years, these charges would be dropped. (New Harmony already has approved paying an additional \$5.09 per month for residential bills and \$18.82 per month for businesses.)

Mr. Daniel Craig, Singers director, said the evening is a scripted event inviting audience participation in "salt violations," carol singing, dancing, and interplay with the cast. The Singers will present a program of traditional Madrigal pieces from the Renaissance, stirring music from ancient to modern composers, and traditional carols from throughout the world, he said, noting composers will include Thomas Morley, Michael Praetorius, John Farmer, Peter Tschesnokoff, and Franz Biebl.

Proceeds from USI's oldest tradition help support the Singers' costuming, music, travel, and competition costs.
