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THIRTY TEACHERS SELECTED FOR HSI PROGRAM. Thirty elementary, middle, and high school teachers from across Indiana have been selected to participate in an intensive study of historic southern Indiana in a two-year program funded through a \$272,000 grant from the Education Division of the National Endowment for the Humanities. "Indiana and the New Nation, 1776-1876" was developed by Historic Southern Indiana Project, an alliance of educators, economic development officials, and historic resource managers in the Ohio and lower Wabash river valleys. The program will bring the teachers together with nationally prominent scholars for two summer institutes (July 10-28, 1989, and July 9-27, 1990), studying themes suggested by several important historic sites in the region which will be an integral part of the learning experience. There also will be four weekend teaching seminars exploring the implications of the summer institutes for the Indiana classroom. **Dr. Darrel E. Bigham**, professor of history at the University of Southern Indiana and HSIP director, is supervising the program with the aid of a statewide advisory committee and the grant project coordinator, **Ms. Leigh Ann Chammess**. ROPEWALK WRITERS' RETREAT TO HAVE THREE PUBLIC PROGRAMS. The public is invited to three events planned in conjunction with the Ropewalk Writers' Retreat, a week-long program offered by USI for writers of fiction and poetry. The retreat will be held May 21-27 in Historic New Harmony and will feature three nationally prominent writers: **Mr. John Hawkes**, a teacher at Brown University and author of short plays, short stories, and novels; **Ms. Joy Williams**, winner of the 1980 National Magazine Award and author of novels and a collection of stories; and **Mr. Philip Levine**, author of books of criticism, translations, and poetry.
