1983 FREEDOM FESTIVAL. "The Year of the Gold" is the slogan for the 13th Annual Freedom Festival. Destined to be the largest Freedom Festival ever -55 events stretching over 16 days- it begins with the lighting of the festival torch on Saturday, June 25 and culminates with "Thunder on the Ohio" hydroplane races on Sunday, July 10.

ISUE will host and participate in several of the festival events. Riding in the University's 1965 Cadillac convertible, ISUE's Cheerleaders will be a special unit in the Saturday morning parade. The festival will bring Cannons and Muskets to the campus during the historic reenactment of the Battle of Bull Run Sunday, July 3. Other events on the campus are an antebellum wedding, military ball, tobacco spitting contest, washer toss competition, and a relic hunt.

The Evansville Freedom Festival is a community event planned and produced by the nonprofit Freedom Festival Foundation, Inc. Joan Jost, administrative secretary for the vice-president for administration, is a member of the Foundation's Board of Directors.
