One of these is hypertension. 22,950,000 Americans have hypertension, but only one-half of them know it. High blood pressure (hypertension) is a silent, mysterious killer . . . silent because it has no characteristic symptoms. One in every six adults has some elevation of blood pressure, which can result in

stroke, congestive heart failure, kidney disease and is a major risk factor in coronary artery disease. High blood pressure can be detected by a simple test. Once diagnosed, effective treatment is available which can be administered by a physician or other professionals working under direction of a physician. UNIMEDSITY OUTREACH. Ten faculty members of Indiana State University Evansville are participating in a lecture/discussion series for women funded by a grant from the Indiana Committee for the Humanities. The series, University Outreach: Issues in Contemporary Society, is being offered through the ISUE Office of Continuing Education.

Five cities and Evansville have been chosen as sites for University Outreach. The other locations are Mt. Vernon, Newburgh, Tell City, Petersburg, and New Harmony. Various organizations in each of these locations will co-sponsor the series which will begin the week of March 20 and continue through April.

University Outreach will offer important and complex issues of current interest in stimulating, thought-provoking discussion. Many of the sessions will be offered in private homes.

Topics to be covered include education, food additives, genetics, world food population, cancer, drugs, college students and sexuality, inequality in America, energy crisis, crime in American society, the family, censorship, communications in the family, and women's liberation.

DISABILITY OPEN ENROLLMENT MONTH. Eligible full-time faculty and administrative personnel may enroll in the University's disability insurance program during March, 1977, which is an open enrollment month. TIAA disability, whose cost is shared by the University and the employee, is compulsory after three years of service for persons employed after July 31, 1973. No faculty or administrative person may participate in the benefit until three years of University service have been completed, with the exception of certain personnel covered by a former employee for at least five years.

The benefit is detailed on page 4-6 of the ISUE Handbook. Eligible employees may obtain an acceptance card in the Personnel Office. Enrollment by March 20, 1977 assures an April 1 deduction.



CHILDREN'S ART WORKSHOP OFFERED. A Children's Art Workshop will be offered by Indiana State University Evansville for six Saturdays beginning March 19, 1977. Children in Grades 1 through 6 will explore these art processes: clay, weaving, printmaking, drawing, sculpture, and painting.

Mrs. Melody Lewis, an elementary art teacher in Mt. Vernon, Indiana will teach the course, which will be offered from 10:00 a.m. to noon in Room 191 of the Science Center each Saturday. The registration fee is \$25.00.

The children will learn the elements and principles of design and the cultural heritage of the media involved. Most materials and supplies will be furnished. Scrap materials from home may be requested occasionally. Enrollment will be limited to 30.

EXPORT SEMINAR PLANNED. A seminar providing participants with the basic steps to exporting will be held on March 16 in University Center Room 351. Registration begins at 9:30 a.m. with opening remarks at 9:50 a.m. Entitled "A World of Profit," the program will provide an opportunity for area business persons to meet with experts in banking, market development, freight forwarding and international law. The International Trade Division and its co-sponsors will assist those attending to get started in exporting by 1) assessing market potential overseas and, 2) outlining simple time-saving steps to becoming involved in exporting. A luncheon will be held at noon, with the afternoon session beginning at 1:00 p.m. The ISUE Division of Business is one of several sponsors of the seminar.

MEW NON-CREDIT CLASSES BEGINNING. Twelve new classes will be offered in the spring noncredit class series at Indiana State University Evansville. A total of twenty-two classes make up the complete spring roster.
