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ALUMNI TELEFUND SETS RECORD

USI Alumni Association officials are well pleased with the \$61,677 pledged in support of Alumni and University programs during the recent Telefund that achieved a 13 percent increase over 1990 pledging.

The record solicitation was accomplished by 150 alumni, students, faculty, and staff volunteers during ten evenings and two Saturday mornings of telephone calls to more than 4,000 graduates. Individual pledges averaged \$30.96, up two percent over 1990, as 1,992 USI alumni responded to the campaign, a nine percent increase. The total included 395 new donors.

The annual Telefund provides more than 80 percent of the Alumni Association budget, with proceeds used to support activities, scholarships and grants, gifts restricted to specific departments and programs, the scholarship endowment, and administrative costs.

HEALTH NOTES

PREVENT BACK INJURY AT WORK - Good body mechanics are critical on the job, especially if work is physically demanding. Employees should keep their backs aligned in safe positions to help prevent injury. Work safely and maintain the three curves.

Bending and lifting:

- * Bend at hips and knees, jut buttocks out.
- * Tighten stomach muscles.
- * Let leg muscles do the work.
- * Whenever possible, shift load to waist height.

Standing:

- * Stand on both feet, center body weight over hips.
- * Bend knees slightly (don't "lock" them in place).
- * Stand tall. Good posture pays off.

Sitting:

- * Keep work at eye level when possible.
- * Keep knees level with hips or below.

Pushing:

- * Tighten stomach muscles.
- * Keep elbows and equipment close to body.
- * Avoid pulling whenever possible.

Turning:

- * Hold load close to body.
- * Move body as a single unit.
- * Take several steps to avoid twisting.
- * Bend knees when putting load down.
