Psychology Conference: The seventh annual Mid-America Conference for Teachers of Psychology will be held at 9:30 a.m. Friday and 8:30 a.m. Saturday in the University Center, with more than 100 participants from across the country expected to attend for the second straight year. A conference highlight will be a presentation at 2:15 p.m. Friday by Dr. Steve Davis of Emporia State University, immediate past president of the Division of Teaching, American Psychology Association. He will repeat his presidential address, "Academic Dishonesty in the 1990s: Data and Dilemmas," which was presented at an APA meeting in August in Boston, printed in *The New York Times*, and picked up by news media across the nation. It is a report on data collected by Dr. Davis and his colleagues in four years of research, involv-

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ing interviews with more than 6,000 students, and detailing how extensive cheating is among college and university students, and when and why they cheat.
