



CAMPUS OPEN HOUSE SCHEDULED SUNDAY, October 17 is Open House Sunday for the ISUE campus. EMPLOYEE PORTRAIT. JOYCE CRABTREE, staff accountant at ISUE, is a working example of today's woman who often pursues her education and career after her children are in school. JOYCE graduated Magna Cum Laude from Indiana State University Evansville in 1973. She received a bachelor of science degree with double majors in economics and accounting, and was named recipient of an ISUE Academic Achievement Award in Accounting.

As staff accountant JOYCE states, "One of my main responsibilities is the payroll. That one gives you gray hair." In conjunction with payroll, a multitude of reports must be completed, including state and federal tax reports; insurance, retirement, and annuity reports; and work-study billings to go to off campus agencies.

JOYCE was born in Crockett Mills, Tennessee, but moved to New Harmony when she was five years old. She attended grade school and high school in New Harmony and always wanted to be a nurse following graduation. A summer job with the telephone company somehow sidelined the nursing career, then marriage and children postponed it even further. In 1967, when JOYCE could again look to personal growth through education, nursing did not seem as feasible. She remembered liking bookkeeping in high school, plus she liked to work alone.

"I had visualized a bookkeeper as someone who worked by herself off somewhere in a corner, JOYCE said, and that appealed to me. It isn't that way at all, but it is what I wanted to do. You must know how to communicate and express yourself. You meet so many people," she explains. Since graduation, JOYCE has taught two accounting courses at Lockyear's School of Business and has begun work toward a masters degree in business administration at the University of Evansville.

JOYCE and her husband, Ivan, (a foreman at Hahn, Inc. in Evansville) are the parents of three teenagers and reside on the west side. Because of her children, JOYCE has cultivated an interest in several spectator sports, that she never expected to have. She became an avid football fan when daughter, Pam, now a student at ISUE, was the first female drum majorette for the Reitz band. Her interest in basketball stems from again attending games to watch a halftime presentation by the Hilltopper pom pon group, of which daughter Jackie is a member. JOYCE'S son, Mike, a sophomore at Reitz, is interested in everything so she may become very active before he is graduated.

JOYCE is a member of the National Association of Accountants. She serves as Director of Educational Projects for the 350 member organization. She is also treasurer of the Women of ISUE and the ISUE Alumni Association, and has in the past been an active member of the Southern Indiana Status of Women organization.

JOYCE enjoys reading but doesn't have enough time to do it for pleasure. Her real joy is found in 'just plain shopping'. "It sounds strange, JOYCE said, but it's an outlet for me; plus it keeps me up on the latest prices." That's an accountant--always moving with figures in mind.
