CLASSES BEGIN AUGUST 29

A busy week of registration and orientation activities lead up to the start of fall classes on Monday, August 29. NAMES IN THE NEWS. Dr. Josephine M. Elliott, USI archivist emerita, has been selected for an Indiana Humanities Achievement Award for Scholarship, to be presented September 23 in Indianapolis by the Indiana Humanities Council. Dr. Elliott was cited for her forthcoming book, *Partnership for Posterity: Correspondence of William Maclure and Marie D. Fretageot, 1820-1833*, published by the Indiana Historical Society, and for her research and documentation on the history of New Harmony. On an assignment for Mr. Eli Lilly, she also has done research into Walam Olum, a Delaware Indian legend.

Dr. Robert L. Reid, vice president for

Academic Affairs, was a speaker at a national conference, "A New Deal For America," held July 21-23 at Arthurdale, West Virginia. Dr. Reid's topic was "Documenting Arthurdale: Looking at New Deal Photography." The conference celebrated the 60th anniversary of Arthurdale, the best-known community project of the Roosevelt years.

Dr. Reid also was the author of an article, "From Duluth to Bismarck in 1872: Travels with Artist Alfred R. Waud," which was published in the summer 1994 issue of *Minnesota History*. Mr. Waud was a major 19th century illustrator best known for his coverage of Civil War battles. This is the first publication of his sketches of the building of the Northern Pacific Railroad and accompanying travel narratives.
