#### 4. Progress Reports: Faculty Council Standing Committees; Continuing Education

The Chairman requested postponement of discussion of continuing education. He wished to record the reminder that standing committees were obliged to send minutes of their meetings to the Secretary of Faculty Council. The minutes are then available to any faculty member.

#### 5. New Business

a. Concern was expressed by various faculty members that large amounts of paper were being wasted. It was suggested that a recycling program could be developed.

b. President Rice reported that Mr. Holderman of the Lilly Endowment, who had been on campus this day, had expressed interest in interinstitutional cooperative programs.

c. The Chairman reported that President Rice had informed him that the Chairman of the ISUE Faculty Council would be notified of and invited to future ISU Board of Trustees meetings, beginning with the meeting of November 17.

d. The Chairman reported that he had requested a review step for the Faculty Council in the self-study report being prepared for the December 1 deadline set by the North Central Association. Consideration of the report would be an agenda item for the November 14 meeting of Faculty Council. The Chairman would deliver the Faculty Council comment to the November 18 meeting of the Self-Study Steering Committee.

#### 6. Adjournment

The meeting adjourned at 4:55 p.m. to meet next on November 14 at 3:00 p.m. in the Rare Books Room.
