"BE A HERO" THROUGH UNITED WAY

"Be a Hero" is the theme for the 1989 United Way of Southwest Indiana campaign, which has a goal of \$3 million, a 6 percent increase over the \$2,825,000 collected last year.

The USI United Way campaign was launched last Thursday, with a dual goal of increasing employee participation and increasing pledges to more than \$15,000. Last year, 75 percent of USI employees contributed nearly \$14,000.

The USI campaign offers a "Fair Share" lottery again this year. Your "Fair Share" is one half of one percent (.005) of your pre-tax income. Last year, 45 employees pledged "Fair Share" contributions. This year's lottery will provide the following prizes:

Faculty - \$100 travel stipend; Administrators - \$100 travel stipend or one extra vacation day; Clerical and Support Staff - one extra vacation day. In addition, a second lottery will offer two season tickets for USI Eagles basketball and a gift from the USI Bookstore. Pledge your "Fair Share" and you may win one of these prizes!

One of your fellow employees will be your United Way coordinator and will solicit your pledge during the next two weeks. This year's campaign is chaired by Mr. Michael Whipple, controller, and co-chaired by Mr. David C. Cousert, chair of the Social Work Department. Mrs. Jean Stayman, coordinator of annual giving, is campaign advisor.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT HEARING. The Indiana Department of Highways will hold a public hearing on Evansville area projects -- including plans for the USI intersection improvements -- on Wednesday, November 1, in the UCDining Room. NATIONAL ISSUES FORUM. The second of three town hall meetings on national issues will be held at 7 p.m. Thursday, October 26, in Forum I, cosponsored by Leadership Evansville and the USI Sociology Department. "The Environment at Risk: Responding to Growing Dangers" will be the discussion topic. A brief videotape will outline three choices -- Planetary Housekeeping: Blueprint for a Sustainable Future; Balancing Act: Costs and Benefits of a Cleaner Environment; and Carrots and Sticks: Putting a Price on Pollution -- followed by community discussion led by Dr. Charles F. Petranek, USI Sociology Department chair. USI faculty and students

SMOKING POLICY CHANGES EFFECTIVE NOV. 1

The University Smoking Policy has been revised to comply with the Indiana Clean Indoor Air Law. Beginning November 1, smoking will be allowed only in designated areas. Signs are being posted at University building entrances during October, indicating "Smoking is Permitted Only in Designated Areas." Signs indicating "Designated Smoking Area" will be posted clearly in approved areas.

Copies of the revised Smoking Policy and Guidelines are being distributed to all staff members via campus mail and will include the list of designated areas. The success of the policy will require thoughtfulness and cooperation on the part of both smokers and non-smokers. In essence, it is the responsibility of the students, staff, and visitors to ensure compliance with the smoking policy. A person who smokes in a non-designated area commits an infraction of Indiana law and will be subject to appropriate disciplinary action.

Dr. Wagner is a professor of political sciences at the Free University of Berlin (West) and serves as a director for the Institute for Fundamentals and Theory of Politics. Their discussion will cover the following rationale: Eastern Europe now welcomes Western Europe, a small investment can reap big benefits, very high capital return rates are possible, and Eastern Europe can be a start toward business expansion in the Soviet Union and Western Europe.
