Dr. James M. Bandoli — 1997 Distinguished Professor

Dr. James M. Bandoli, associate professor of biology who in 15 years at the University of Southern Indiana has developed a status among students and colleagues as an outstanding scientist, teacher, mentor, and friend, is USI's 1997 National City Bank Distinguished Professor.

The award was announced Monday as 1997 Honors Week programs opened with presentations in the School of Science and Engineering Technology, and will be presented at the 1997 Commencement May 10 at Roberts Stadium.


Dr. Bandoli received a B.S. in biology from the University of San Diego, M.S. from Northern Arizona University, and Ph.D. from the University of New Mexico, and joined the USI faculty in 1982. His efforts in and out of the classroom have inspired students to follow him into careers in the sciences, as they cited his unique ability to make complex studies understandable and enjoyable. One, now a teacher in Olney, Illinois, said it was his experience with Dr. Bandoli that "makes me try to be a fair, knowledgeable, and challenging teacher."

Students told of being privileged to join him in research projects -- primarily the endangered spottail darter in Indiana and the local white-tailed deer population -- and becoming inspired by his ability to challenge

his own findings as he sought answers to lingering questions.

Colleagues cited Dr. Bandoli's balance between wisdom, sympathy, and justice, whether serving on student and faculty appeals committees at the University or look-

Dr. Bertram receives first Berger Community Service Award

Dr. Charles J. Bertram, professor of mathematics education, has been selected by the University of Southern Indiana Faculty and Academic Affairs Committee to receive the first annual Sydney and Sadelle Berger Faculty Community Service Award. His nomination and selection -- based primarily on his efforts to create Eagle Math Mania for second and third graders in Evansville -- was announced Monday, March 24, at the opening of 1997 Honors Week programs at USI.

Dr. Bertram has been a math educator in southern Indiana for more than 30 years. His nomination for the Berger award by USI basketball Coach Bruce Pearl cited Dr. Bertram's concern over falling math scores among the nation's children and his decision to try to improve those scores at home. Dr. Bertram began in 1995 to put together

a framework for Eagle Math Mania, working with Evansville-Vanderburgh School Corporation representatives. The pilot program was introduced in spring semester 1996 and by fall, all of Evansville's public elementary schools had been brought into a program designed to make math fun for the youngsters. Local corporate sponsors also make it rewarding, while the USI championship coaches and athletes have

Corey Kendall selected for USI Trustees Merit Award



ing at environmental issues in the community. Dr. Bandoli is a member of ChemQuery, a group of local scientists who compile information on environmental matters and present it to the public to allow informed decisions. He also is ChemQuery's representative to ACORN (Action Committee for Ozone Reduction Now).

Dr. Bandoli has served actively on most University committees, including chairing both the committees on Faculty and Academic Affairs and Students and Academic Affairs and the annual Honors Symposium. He was faculty advisor for the Science and Ecology Club for 13 years, guiding students through regular cleanup of Reflection Lake on campus and Pigeon Creek in the city, monthly

recycling efforts before it became a city program, and many other projects.

The Bandoli family lives in Mt. Vernon, Indiana, where they have been involved in school and community activities. A school official described Bandoli as "a risk taker...who leads not only with inspiration but with sound philosophy...", demonstrated in the creation of a Parent Advisory Committee at Mt. Vernon Junior High School that provides a channel of communication and supports teacher creativity through mini-grants.

Dr. Bandoli will receive a \$1,000 grant as recipient of the National City Bank Distinguished Professor Award, will select a student to receive a scholarship in his name next year, and will deliver the Distinguished Professor Lecture at a later date.

added excitement as they greet students at pep rallies on campus and visit individual schools for awards ceremonies. USI math students helped create the sports-oriented workbooks for math mania and Dr. Bertram's program now is becoming a model for other schools across the nation.

Dr. Bertram was chair of the former Division of Education for 14 years, teacher certification director for nine years, and for many years has been an Indiana examiner for the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education and the Indiana Teacher Education Standards Board. He is a long-time member and president of the Indiana Library and Historical Board, being appointed in 1984 by former Governor Robert D. Orr, and long-time member and former officer of the Indiana Textbook Adoptions Advisory Committee of the State Board of Education.

Dr. Bertram also has been USI faculty athletics representative to the NCAA

since the mid-1970s and has been involved with the Great Lakes Valley Conference (GLVC) since its inception. He began a two-year term in January as president of the GLVC, which includes serving as liaison to the Council of Presidents and representing the conference at NCAA meetings and workshops. He was GLVC treasurer for many years and served on many GLVC committees. He also has been an IHSAA basketball referee for more than 20 years and has been a youth coach at his church.

Dr. Bertram received an A.B. degree from the University of Evansville, M.S. from Southern Illinois University-Carbondale, and Ph.D. from Indiana University. A Gibson County native, he taught at Haubstadt, Elberfeld, and Evansville North high schools and at SIU prior to joining the USI faculty in 1969. He and his wife Mary Alice have two adult sons.

The \$500 Community Service Award was established in the USI Foundation by Mr. and Mrs. Charles L. Berger in memory of his parents, the late Sydney and Sadelle Berger. The citation which Vice

President Robert Reid presented stated:

"Sydney and Sadelle Berger were lifelong partners in improving the lot of those less fortunate. They believed in the freedoms extended by the Constitution and the Bill of Rights and passionately fought to assure that they were extended to everyone, regardless of social circumstances. As community volunteers, they were peerless. They worked tirelessly for civil rights and humanitarian issues. And they were self-effacing in the community work. Love of others and a real care for social welfare in our community led them into one cause after another -- Sydney using his brilliant legal mind to advocate and promote social and human equality and Sadelle using her extraordinary creativity and high energy to help those who could not help themselves. Though they won numerous accolades from community, church, and profession, they sought nothing but the personal satisfaction of knowing that this community might be a better place as a result of their efforts. Thus, it is fitting that the first award to recognize community service by a faculty member be named and presented in their honor."

Three special lectures slated in early April

The USI community is invited to three special programs in early April, when nationally known educators and a philanthropist will visit the campus to meet with faculty, staff, and students, and to deliver public lectures.

Dr. Stephen Jay Gould

Dr. Gould, who has been called America's best known evolutionist, will visit USI on Wednesday, April 2, as a guest in the Distinguished Lecture in the Natural Sciences series supported by a USI Foundation fund provided by Dr. Frank L. Stanonis, professor emeritus of geology and geography, and his wife Marilyn.

Dr. Gould will deliver a public lecture at 7:30 p.m. in Carter Hall on the topic "Human Insignificance and Geological Imminence: The Proper Measure of our Ecological Crisis." He also will attend a breakfast at 7:45 a.m. Thursday, April 3, with USI science honor students and participate in a student/faculty symposium at 9 a.m. His visit is being coordinated by Dr. Jerome R. Cain, dean of the School of Science and Engineering Technology. He invites faculty, staff, and students to submit questions in advance, with a University committee to select those to be posed to Dr. Gould at the symposium.

Dr. Emmanuel N. Obiechina

Dr. Obiechina, a Nigerian who has been a visiting professor of humanities at several U.S. institutions in the '90s, will visit USI in early April in a program being coordinated by Mr. Eric von Fuhrmann, assistant professor of English and a personal friend of Dr. Obiechina. On Friday, April 4, Dr. Obiechina will visit classes, lunch with faculty, meet with committees, and deliver a public lecture, "What Really Happened to Africa," at 7:30 p.m. in Mitchell Auditorium. On Saturday, he will tour Historic New Harmony; faculty members are invited to join the tour. His visit is sponsored by the School of Liberal Arts and the Multicultural Center.

Dr. Obiechina has spent the past seven years as a visiting professor at Hobart and William Smith Colleges (1990-92), University of Pittsburgh at Bradford (1992-95), University of New Mexico (1995-96), and Ferrum College in Virginia (1996-97).

Mr. Millard Dean Fuller

Mr. Fuller and 28 colleagues established Habitat for Humanity International nearly 21 years ago. He will visit USI on Monday, April 7, as a guest in the Robert and Rossanna Enlow Distinguished Lecture series, meeting with students and faculty at 10 a.m. and speaking at a public program at 7:30 p.m., all in Carter Hall. The visit is being coordinated through Evansville Habitat for Humanity, whose leaders — Mr. James Perigo, a contractor, and the Rev. James Prickett, retired minister in the United Church of Christ — have been affiliated with the international organization since it was established in 1976. The parent group now boasts more than 50,000 homes built by affiliates throughout the U.S. and abroad; 13,000 homes have been built in the U.S.

The five were part of the Becker CPA Review course offered for the first time on the USI campus in preparation for the November exam. More than 1,000 candidates sat for the exam in Indiana, 60,000 nationwide. The pass rate for all four sections of the November exam among first-time candidates who had taken the Becker course at USI was 39 percent (11 of 28), which is substantially better than the normal national

Baker noted the award recognizes not only academic excellence in the student's major, but the value that a liberal education brings to the student.

Mr. Kendall, in a paper submitted with his nomination, stated he had been one-dimensional, concentrating only on what he deemed practical or potentially useful professionally, until he enrolled in a survey of western tradition class. He said his interest in the social sciences and humanities "rose dramatically" and his contact "has made me a more versatile thinker and has given me a better sense of history, which leads to becoming a more productive, knowledgeable person...my education has given me the mental tools and knowledge to continue to learn and develop, both professionally and personally."

A chemistry professor who supported Mr. Kendall's nomination for the Trustees Award said Kendall frequently scored 100 percent on tests where others were averaging 50 percent. The professor said he "wished (Mr. Kendall) was majoring in chemistry. He will do outstanding work in whatever field he chooses and will be a strong asset to any community."

Mr. Kendall is a 1993 graduate of Washington (Indiana) High School. He came to USI as a Presidential Scholar and is completing his college work with a perfect 4.0 grade point average, as he did in high school. He has been accepted by the Indiana University School of Medicine to continue with his education.

Mr. Kendall is a member of Sigma Zeta science honorary at USI. At Washington, he was a member of the Beta and French clubs and played varsity football and basketball. He also was a member of 4-H and its junior leadership group.
