STUDENT HOUSING READY FOR OCCUPANCY IN AUGUST. The Mid-America Student Housing complex on Clarke Lane will be ready for occupancy this August. Applications for one- and two-bedroom apartments are now available from Marantha Wink, coordinator and director of student housing, at extension 1849. There are 36 one-bedroom units available at \$245.00 per month unfurnished, or \$275.00 per month furnished. The 136 two-bedroom apartments are available at \$495.00 per semester, or \$1,200.00 for the school year and summer. Only one-bedroom apartments are available for married couples. Payments may be made by semester, by the month, or for the whole year.

Water is included in the fees, but electricity costs must be borne by the students. Cable hookups are available in all units.

Students may attend a special preview showing of a furnished model apartment in the new Mid-America Student Housing complex Saturday and Sunday, May 26 and 27 from 10:00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m. Parents and guests are also invited to the preview. The leasing and rental agent will be on duty with complete information.

ISUE COMMUNAL GARDEN PLOTS. The communal garden plots are ready for planting, and are open to faculty, staff, and students of ISUE. Last year's gardeners have priority on their plots, but only if they act promptly and call in their intentions.

They all increase your odds for getting heart disease. How much? The answer is different for each person, depending on family history and on how many of

these "health risks" you have. Your doctor can tell you how big a chance you may be taking with your health by not controlling risks that can be modified or eliminated. How much risk is too much? Ask yourself. Then ask your doctor for help in changing every day habits to help you beat the odds.
