UNIVERSITY CENTER TOWN MEETING

The University community is encouraged to attend a town meeting at 3 p.m. Wednesday, April 27, in UC352, to hear the updated plans for the \$4.1-million renovation and expansion of the University Center.

The meeting will be led by **Dr. Donald D. Bennett**, vice president for Student Affairs; **Mr. Barry K. Schonberger**, dean of students; **Mr. Stephen P. Helfrich**, Physical Plant director, and possibly **Mr. Richard W. Schmidt**, vice president for Business Affairs. A list of campus/University Center needs as currently envisioned will be distributed at the meeting.

Mr. Schonberger said plans call for a new ballroom, auditorium, and recreation room, and additional space for conferences, lounges, and club and organization offices. The town meeting will invite comment on those plans and any new suggestions for campus needs in the expanded center.

MID-AMERICA SINGERS, CONCERT CHOIR

The Mid-America Singers and Band will present their annual spring concert at 7 p.m. Saturday, April 30, in Forum I, an energy-packed program of contemporary music and lively choreography -- pop, rock, blues, Broadway, country and western, and other selections. The University Center Coordinating Council will work closely with the architect, expected to be selected this spring, in completing plans for the new facility. Mr. Schonberger said groundbreaking probably won't come until spring 1995, and other campus town meetings are anticipated as planning progresses.

Mr. Covey is chairman and founder of Covey Leadership Center, a 500-member international firm whose clients range from Fortune 500 companies to small and mid-size companies and organizations worldwide. He is the author of *The Seven Habits of Highly Effective People, Principle-Centered Leadership*, and his latest book, *First Things First*. The videoconference is produced by Covey Leadership Center and presented by the Business Channel, a division of the Public Broadcasting Service (PBS). Participants will learn specific techniques to leverage time, vision, results, and relationships, and learn why "you can hire your employees' hands and backs, but only they can volunteer their minds and hearts."

USI TO AID WNIN. WNIN-Channel 9, the local PBS station, has been awarded a \$41,484 grant by the Corporation for Public Broadcasting to create a community-wide education and information service. The station has joined with other community organizations, including USI, to build WNIN ONLINE, a community-based telecommunications system that will provide non-profit access to the information superhighway. The community organizations -- *The Evansville Courier*, Evansville-Vanderburgh School Corporation, public libraries, Evansville Housing Authority, Community Action Program of Evansville, and USI -- will help to assure that all segments of the local population have access to the electronic superhighway.
