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STATE-WIDE SOCIAL SCIENTISTS AT USI. The University will be host for the state meeting of the Indiana Academy of the Social Sciences on Friday, October 3, when a series of panel presentations on "The Internationalization of Indiana" will be presented. Among topics to be discussed by 36 scholars representing 16 colleges and universities will be "Indiana Steel and the World," "Biracial Adoption," "The Geography Gap in Teacher Training," and "Internationalizing Indiana Business." Morning panels will meet at 9:30 a.m., focusing on business administration, geography, and political science. Afternoon panels will meet at 2:10 p.m., focusing on economics, sociology, history, and international studies.

The plenary speaker following the noon luncheon will be Dr. George J. Stolnitz, professor of economics at Indiana University, Bloomington. His topic will be "International Trade, International Development, and the Indiana Economy." Dr. Leslie P. Singer, economist at IU Northwest, will preside at the luncheon session.

The meeting will be held in the University Center, starting with registration at 8:30 a.m. There is a \$3 registration fee. For details, contact Dr. Charles T. Barber, USI professor of political science, at extension 1719. Dr. Barber is current executive secretary of the Indiana Academy and is coordinating local arrangements.

HISTORIC COMMUNAL SOCIETIES CONFERENCE. The USI Center for Communal Studies will conduct the 13th annual Historic Communal Societies Conference October 9-11 at the Shaker Village in Canterbury, New Hampshire. The theme this year is "The Experience of Community: Gender, Religion, Ideology." There are 53 scheduled speakers and moderators, representing 42 universities in 19 states, England, and Israel; 30 historic and current communal groups are expected to be represented. Two Shaker eldresses, who are among only nine surviving Shaker sisters, are to bring greetings to the meeting. Many of the papers will be printed in Communal Societies, the official publication of the meeting's co-sponsor, the National Historic Communal Societies Association. Conference programs and back volumes of Communal Societies are available in the office of Dr. Donald E. Pitzer, USI professor of history and director of the Center for Communal Studies.

SENIOR RADIOLOGY STUDENTS WIN STATE HONORS. Two USI student groups' exhibitions won first— and third—place honors in a scientific exhibition for students at the state convention of the Indiana Society of Radiologic Technology September 24-27 in Indianapolis. Senior students enrolled in the Deaconess Hospital radiology program won first place with "Diagnosing Chest Lesions with CT Scanning;" senior students enrolled in the St. Mary's Hospital radiology program won third place with "Intraluminal Irradiation." In addition, Ms. Debbie Poelhuis, clinical instructor in the Deaconess radiology program, was named Indiana Technologist of the Year.

HUMANITIES FORUMS. Mr. Stewart Kershaw, music director of the Evansville Philharmonic Orchestra, will speak at 1 p.m. today (October 1) in Forum II on the topic, "What Is a Conductor?" and will discuss the economic and social impact a symphony orchestra has on its own city. A native of England, Mr. Kershaw studied in London, Paris, Venice, and Tanglewood in the United States. He has held permanent contracts with opera houses in London, Lyon, Munich, Paris, and Stuttgart. He has been a guest conductor in almost all European countries, Australia, Brazil, Canada, and South Africa. Mr. Kershaw was chief conductor of the Kyoto (Japan) Symphony from 1978 to 1980, when he joined the Evansville Philharmonic. He also is music director of the Seattle Ballet Company and the Palm Beach Symphony.

The next Humanities Forum speaker will be Mr. Roger McBain, cultural affairs reporter for The Evansville Press. His topic will be "The Hack and the Flaks," a lecture on the relationship between journalists and public relations practitioners, for the 1 p.m. program Monday, October 13 in Forum II.

"SINCE THE BEGINNING" SLATED AT GALLERY. The New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art will present the recent work of three artists -- Mr. John Begley, Mr. Darryl Halbrooks, and Mr. Rick Paul -- who were deeply involved with the Gallery's genesis as a viable art space in the Tri-State. "Since the Beginning" will open Sunday, October 5 with a reception from 1 to 5 p.m., and continue through October 30.

Mr. Begley was founding director of the New Harmony Gallery and currently is executive director of the Water Tower Art Association in Louisville. He will show drawings and paintings of area landscapes.

Mr. Halbrooks, an Evansville native and UE graduate who is associate professor of art at Eastern Kentucky University, Richmond, will show paintings relating to his travels in Europe.

Mr. Paul, whose installation sculptures have been exhibited across the United States, will show recent large-scale drawings (6 feet long) that trick the eye with three-dimensional depth. He is an associate professor of art at Purdue University and has juried USI student art shows.

ALCOHOL/DRUG SUPPORT GROUP PLANNED. Around 15 USI staff members and students have enrolled in a six-week training program, "Health and Hope for the Alcohol/Substance Abuser," sponsored by Parkside Lodge at Mulberry Center. The training sessions started Tuesday, September 30, with the USI group planning to develop a campus support team to be available in the event of need. Father Anthony Kissel, director of Campus Ministry, and Mr. Robert Harper, director of the Counseling Office, are leading the group which also includes members of AMIGOs and the resident student directors at MASH and Campus Apartments.

SMOKING CESSATION PROGRAM PLANNED. With the "Great American Smokeout" nearing its 10th anniversary on November 20th, USI Health Services plans to enhance the campus project this year by organizing a Freshstart Smoking Cessation Progam around the Smokeout. Trained facilitators are needed to to organize and conduct the Freshstart program, with interested persons invited to attend a free facilitator training program from 6:30 to 8 p.m. on Wednesday, October 15 at the local office of the American Cancer Society. Mrs. Sandi Lawrence, director of Health Services and city chairman this year for the Great American Smokeout, said facilitators need not be experts — just a former or non-smoker. She said Freshstart clinics use proven small group dynamics to teach the coping skills needed to master the physical and mental aspects of quitting.
