### *Founders Day to honor seven*

The 1996 Founders Day program and reception will begin at 3:30 p.m. Monday, September 16, in Mitchell Auditorium. Seven faculty and staff members will be honored, including:

**Dr. Charles T. Barber**, professor of political science —

Dr. Barber has been chair of the Philosophy and Political Science Department since it was established in the reorganization that followed USI separation in 1985. A native of the Washington, D.C./Silver Springs, Maryland area, he received a B.A. from West Virginia Wesleyan, and M.A. and Ph.D. from American University in D.C. He taught at East Tennessee State four years, then joined the USI faculty. Dr. Barber has been active with various professional groups dealing with national and world politics, with a focus on the Middle East that developed from a National Endowment for the Humanities summer seminar in 1977. He has since been involved with group study visits to India (1975-'76), United Arab Emirates and Saudi Arabia ('87), Syria and Kuwait ('92), and Morocco and Tunisia ('96).

Dr. Barber is proud of what his department has been able to accomplish. Most majors went on to law school in the early years, he notes, but they are becoming more diversified in the '90s, with many of them getting graduate degrees, several going into politics. Dr. Barber said more doors are open for students now, but he has been amazed at how many have returned to the Tri-State to develop their careers.

Dr. Barber's wife, Ms. Carolyn Roth, is a USI art lecturer. He has two daughters, Ms. Gretchen Barber, an elementary teacher in Madisonville, Kentucky,

and Ms. Katrina Barber, a USI senior sociology major.

**Mr. Larry J. Feldhaus**, mail and store-room supervisor —

Mr. Feldhaus joined the staff as chief of records and mail clerk in September 1971 and became mail and storeroom supervisor in 1976. He has a B.S. in business management from Indiana State University and has participated in USI Extended Services Management Diagnostic Center program. Mr. Feldhaus also has been active in the Postal Customer Council affiliated with the Evansville Post Office. He and his wife Ann Marie have two children.

**Dr. Walter A. Hopkins**, professor of sociology —

Dr. Hopkins received a Ph.D. from Iowa State University and taught at Mankato State College and Central College, both in Iowa, prior to joining the USI faculty in fall 1971. For 12 years, he headed the department and notes most of those he hired have stayed, providing continuity. He feels USI development has gone well, in terms of faculty, courses, and the physical facilities, adding, "I believe the faculty is as good as you will find anywhere."

He became a community activist in the '70s, heading the group, Law in American Society, which provided high school teachers with current law in such areas as the environment and criminal and labor law. He was board president of the

### **Archaeology Week observance**

USI, Historic New Harmony, and Historic Southern Indiana are among the sponsors of an Indiana Archaeology Week observance September 23-29 in Posey County, which will open with a free public lecture by Dr. Cheryl Ann Munson at 7 p.m. September 23 in Alexandrian Public Library, Mt. Vernon. The Indiana University archaeologist will discuss "Posey County Archaeology: From PaleoIndians to Pioneers."

During the following week, daily programs will be conducted for Posey County fourth graders. The observance will conclude with open house from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday and Sunday, September 28-29, at IU excavations at the Hovey Lake site southwest of Mt. Vernon. Dr. Munson and her assistants will explain excavation methods and interpret deposits and materials. Ms. Marjorie Jones, USI anthropologist, will show aspects of a field laboratory. Visitors should go to the Hovey Lake office, where a van will transport them to the excavation area. Picnic facilities and rest rooms are available near the office; the open house is not handicapped-accessible.

There are more than 1,000 archaeological sites recorded for Posey County, although 95 percent of the county has not been surveyed. All known Native American sites are older than written history, with an archaeological time line indicating the first Native Americans arrived about 10,000 B.C., a PaleoIndian era stretching 4,000 years, with six sites identified by archaeologists. This is followed by the Archaic era (245 sites identified), Woodland era (400 sites), Mississippian era (147 sites), and Euro-American era (109 sites). There also are 262 multiple-period sites identified.

Community Action Program of Evansville, 1973-75, and helped organize the Bellemeade-Bayard Park Neighborhood Association, the first neighborhood organization in the city. He was involved with setting up a mediation movement in Evansville, and training 20 mediators to provide community service. He continues to be active with such community groups as the Domestic Violence Task Force.

Dr. Hopkins devoted much of his time in the '80s to research and making presentations before professional groups; he had five papers published during that period.

**Dr. Gordon E. Kelley, professor emeritus of health professions and former associate dean, School of Nursing and Health Professions —**

Dr. Kelley retired July 1, having completed a quarter of a century teaching in health professions at USI. A native Hoosier, he graduated from Indiana University in 1957 with a teaching degree in biological sciences. He was working in a hospital following military service, and decided that medical school was not in his future but science teaching was. He returned to IU, received a dental degree in 1964, and joined the faculty of the IU School of Dentistry.

He came to USI in 1971 and retired as associate dean for health professions in the School of Nursing and Health Professions. He is proud of the University's accomplishments and his participation in USI's hard-won separation in 1985 as well as the remarkable growth for the school. "It has been a very pleasurable experience," Dr. Kelley said when he retired. "There was something new all the time to keep us on our toes..."

Dr. Kelley is perhaps best known in the community as the host of *Radio Theatre*, which was aired every Saturday for eight years on the University radio station WSWI. The vintage radio programs he played each week came from his own collection, which at one point numbered more than 100,000 episodes. He plans to donate the collection to the David L. Rice

Library. Dr. Kelley has turned to creative writing and will fill his retirement days working on several articles and books, including a horror novel of the Steven King variety. He and his wife Gail plan to spend time with their four daughters.

**Dr. Jackson L. Marr, associate professor of biology —**

Dr. Marr said his arrival at USI in 1971 was "the right time and place for me to be." He said he had taken extra courses in graduate school at Iowa State University, Ames, to develop a broader background to bring to teaching and at USI, he found the teaching school he wanted. He received a B.S. from the University of Northern Iowa, Ph.D. from Iowa State, then taught high school a year before coming to USI. Aside from the usual committee service, he was department chair (1987-88), Alpha Omega Psi faculty advisor for 14 years, and last year, found himself fascinated by Mexico in a four-week Rotary study group tour.

Dr. Marr was the USI men's varsity tennis coach for 22 years, taking over a tennis club in '72 that entered intercollegiate competition a year later. His 22-year record of 155-121 included Great Lakes Valley Conference championships in 1980 and 1985; his best season was 1994, when the team went 19-5. He decided to retire after the 1995 season because "I found I was just hurting in too many places." He remains a Varsity Club member and is board treasurer.

Dr. Marr's wife Barbara is a second-grade teacher at Tekoppel School. They have three sons, Mr. Scott Johnson of Logansport, Indiana; Mr. Rex Johnson of South Dakota State University; and Mr. Jeffery Marr of Indianapolis.

**Mrs. Roberta Schweizer, senior secretary, School of Liberal Arts —**

Mrs. Schweizer is a Warrick County native who came to Evansville to attend Lockyear's Business College. She later worked at the old Servel plant for three years, then was married to the late Mr. Gilbert Schweizer. Her youngest child was a year old when she returned to work part-time in 1970, filling in on the housekeep-

ing staff at the University. In June 1971, she became the evening switchboard operator and stayed there six years before moving to Liberal Arts as a secretary. Now she is back on a part-time schedule, generally Monday through Thursday morning, although special projects can keep her working all week.

One of Mrs. Schweizer's initial duties — and it continues to this day — was to handle all reservations and tickets for the USI Madrigal Feastes. She handled the same tasks when the School of Liberal Arts took over operations for The New Harmony Theater and *Young Abe Lincoln*, but the latter duties now have been transferred to the Theatre Center.

"I really have enjoyed the students," Mrs. Schweizer said. "I feel I have helped them...especially those who were kind of shy." When she started at USI, everything was housed in one building and she said people have a hard time believing that today. She also remembers when there was no class after 2 p.m. on Friday, but now classes run straight through to the evening sessions.

Mrs. Schweizer is the mother of 11 children — four electricians, three pipefitters, one in air-conditioning, a school cafeteria manager, and a computer operator — who have given her 28 grandchildren. She is happy to spend her spare time crocheting or watching grandchildren in sports.

**Mrs. Bette K. Walden, director of the David L. Rice Library, currently on leave —**

Mrs. Walden received an A.B. in English in 1968 and M.L.S. in 1971 from Indiana University, where she was Phi Beta Kappa. She taught English and Spanish at Edgewood High School near Bloomington for two years, then came to USI in 1971 as a reference librarian. She became acting director in 1976, director a year later, then assumed management of Media Services in 1978. Mrs. Walden oversaw the \$1-million library renovation, 1981-83, and in 1984, started Rice Library toward automation.

The Hovey Lake site is a late prehistoric Native American village of the Mississippian period Caborn-Welborn culture. IU's test excavations in 1978-79 uncovered a burned house that provided seldom-preserved details about building methods and furnishings. In 1981-82, the Southwind site revealed the first evidence of Mississippian grain storage silos at a site dated around A.D. 1200 and believed to be an outlying village of a chiefdom centered at Angel Mounds on Evansville's East Side. A looting incident at the GE mound in 1988 led to important court and legislative legal protections being enacted for archaeological sites. This year, the archaeologists are excavating test units to learn about diet and to date the site.

### Dr. DiPietro to speak

**Dr. Joseph A. Dipietro**, assistant professor of geology, will discuss his Himalayan geological research at the Science Roundtable at 12 noon Tuesday, September 17, in UC118. The University community is invited to hear his progress report on the continuing search for clues to earth formations and movements in northern Pakistan the last 200 million years and their effect on climate. It was a search begun when he visited Pakistan in the '80s, while he was working towards a Ph.D. at Oregon State University. He received a \$250,000 National Science Foundation grant in 1994 to continue his research, returning to Pakistan for three-month periods in 1994 and 1995; he will go back to Pakistan for six-week periods in 1996 and 1997 to complete field work for his research. Dr. DiPietro's work is in the Tarabela Lake area, where little research has been done. He hopes to be able to match historical accounts of ancient events with evidence he finds, with a result of introducing fresh ideas on what is occurring in the region today.

The Office of Grants and Sponsored Research is introducing a one-year access to a funding database via Telnet or the World Wide Web which allows faculty members with access to Internet via the USI computer system to conduct their own database searches for research and scholarly activity funding. The receipt time, accuracy, and pertinence of the information received will be greatly improved.

The Illinois Researcher Information Service (IRIS) database of funding opportunities has been compiled for 15 years at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. IRIS contains over 7,000 descriptions of federal and private funding opportunities in the sciences, social sciences, arts, and humanities. It includes a wide variety of funding agencies and covers programs that support many activities, including research, teaching or curriculum/program development, seminars or conferences, travel, equipment or materials acquisition, collaborative activities, and operating or general support.
