Sorry we're late this week

In the newspaper business deadlines are key —unless the electricity goes out.

On Tuesday, that's exactly what happened to *The Shield* when the power on campus was disrupted for nearly eight hours.

Editors had been working on *The Shield* since Sunday, but, when the power went out, all of the pages that had been completed for this week's edition were lost.

Shield staff members worked to re-create the entire newspaper on Wednesday, missing the Wednesday press deadline but getting the newspaper out despite the crisis.

"It was definitely a crisis, but we stuck together and got the paper finished," said Editor-in-Chief, Mark Buczkowski. "We hope things go more smoothly for the rest of the semester."

According to Miles Mann, assistant director of the physical plant, a main fuse in the plant was the culprit. The campus is divided into the north side and south side. A "loop" of electricity provides power to the entire campus. Because of all of the new construction on the south side of campus, the overloaded fuse could not handle the power needed.

The north and south boundaries have been moved.

With the power being redistributed, Mann doesn't foresee more problems.

Numbers are up, parking's down on campus

If you're already tired of trying to find a place to park on campus, better get used to it.

In case you haven't already noticed, enrollment is up and parking spaces are down, way down.

According to Barry Hart, director of safety and security, 120 parking spots are being taken up by the fenced-in construction area

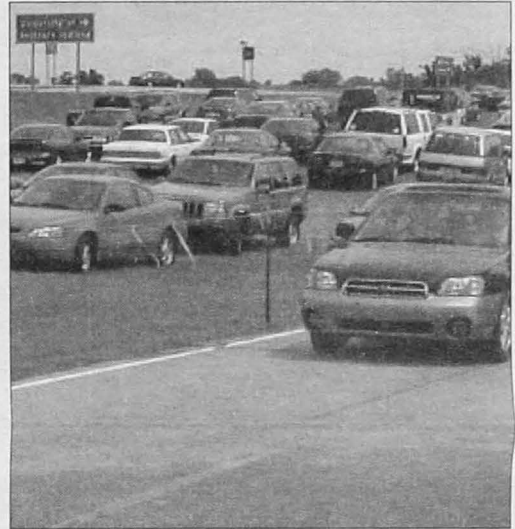
in and around the Health Professions parking lot.

An additional 30-70 spots will be used by construction workers during peak construction.

Estimating that the construction may take up to two years, that means future headaches for USI faculty, students and staff as well.

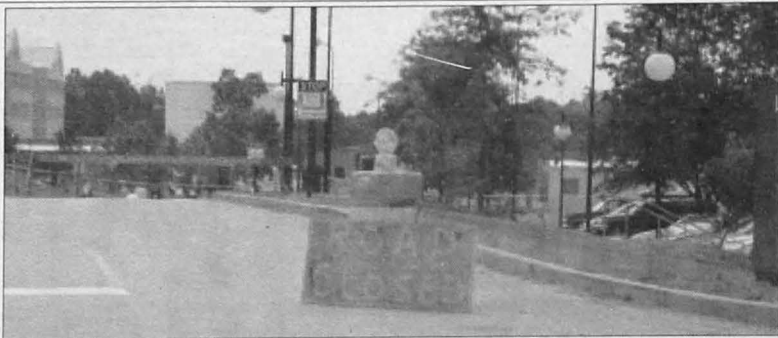

tennis courts, which is due to open sometime in October, will help ease some of the congestion.

Parking has been added in grassy areas around campus.

However, Hart says, if we receive a large amount of rain, the grassy areas will no longer be suitable, making a bad situation even worse.

Although the lack of parking is a problem the security staff anticipates every fall, this year it is worse.

Because of everyone trying to find adequate parking, traffic is being backed up onto the overpass at the entrance to campus.

Hart says security will be working on trying to solve that problem this week and in the weeks to come.

According to unofficial totals, first-day enrollment at USI was about 9,200 students. That's an increase over last year's enrollment.

Official enrollment figures are not released until after the first full week of classes.

A 1999 graduate of Reitz High School in Evansville, Jermakowicz serves as attorney general for the Student Government Association for 2001-02 and has been a leader in other student organizations, including the USI chapter of the American Chemical Society.

In 2001, he was student liaison to the National Task Force on Student Programming for the American Chemical Society. He

is majoring in biology, chemistry, and German.

After earning an undergraduate degree at USI, Jermakowicz hopes to enter a program leading to a combined M.D./Ph.D. degree, preparing him to be a practicing physician, a research scientist, and a medical school professor.

An outstanding science student, Jermakowicz placed fourth in 1999 at the Intel International Science Fair in Philadelphia after winning local and state awards.

He has conducted independent research in chemistry and biology at USI and just completed an 11-week summer fellowship involving research in molecular neurobiology at Washington University in St. Louis.

There's a rumor going around Hollywood that writer/director Kevin Smith will be adapting and directing a new *Fleisch* prequel. This new *Fleisch* film will supposedly take place before the previous two. Chevy Chase did a hilarious job playing the sarcastic slightly idiotic detective who solves crimes in a round a bout kind of manner. V-baller's drop two matches over weekend

USI's women's volleyball team fell on hard times last Saturday against two conference opponents at the University of Missouri-St. Louis Volleyball tournament.

First, the screaming eagles dropped a match to Southern Illinois University Edwardsville, three games to one.

Then in the second

match, USI rebounded by winning the first two games, only to lose the next three, handing the match to UMSL 3-2.

However, the eagles did salvage some good play from the two losses.

Junior Shannon Wells had 18 kills and a .341 hitting percentage in the first game. Wells then added 26 kills with a .423 hitting percentage in the second to lead the team.

Freshman LEEANNE GROSS and freshman

Kristine Wheeler also played well for USI in game one with 15 kills from Gross and 12 digs from Wheeler.

Leah Mercer, a senior middle blocker from Evansville, added 15 kills in the second loss.

The screaming eagles don't come home until Sept. 10, but will take their 1-3 record to the Amerihost Invitational Tournament Saturday at Grand Valley State University.

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Eagles 2-0-0 in preseason

Men ready to get ball rolling

USI finished the 2001 preseason with a 2-0-0 record after defeating Southwestern Illinois College, 3-1, at Strassweg Field and St. Louis Community College at Forest Park, 5-4, on the road.

USI was led by sophomore forward Matt Settle, who had four goals in the

two contests.

Second on the team in scoring was newcomer Scott Henderson, a sophomore forward who had two goals in the match at Forest Park.

Between the posts, junior Chris Davis led the squad allowing one goal in 90:00 of action. Davis played the first half of each of the exhibition games.

Last fall, USI was 0-2-0 in preseason matches.

The Screaming Eagles are looking for their first return trip to the GLVC Tournament since they won back-to-back champi-

onships in 1990 and 1991. USI made its first appearance in the tournament since 1995 last fall.

The Eagles, excluding their years at Division I (1992-94), have won the GLVC title nine times and appeared in the tournament 14 times in 18 seasons.

USI opens GLVC action on the road at the University of Indianapolis Friday, Sept. 14, at 3 p.m. The first league match at Strassweg Field will be on Friday, Sept. 21, when the University of Wisconsin-Parkside comes to Evansville.

Kunkle named softball head coach

The University of Southern Indiana has named Sue Kunkle as its new head softball coach. Kunkle replaces Beth Watson who accepted a position at the University of Central Florida.

Kunkle helped to develop some of the University of Akron's best hurlers, including 1998 UA Female Athlete of the Year Shelby Howell (1995-1998).

Prior to her tenure at Akron, Kunkle began her coaching career as a volunteer assistant at Cali-

fornia University of Pennsylvania. She gained a year of coaching experience at Morehead State University in Kentucky, before being named assistant coach at Bethel Park.

A four-year starter at California, Kunkle became the winningest pitcher in school history with a career record of 54-12 from 1990-94.

The Vulcans earned PSAC West Championships in Kunkle's last three seasons, and were the conference's overall champs in 1991.

An All-Region pitcher as a junior, she earned All-Conference and All-Regional Tournament honors as a senior, while leading her team to a regional championship and California's first-ever appearance in the Division II College World Series.

USI Athletic Director Steve Newton said, "We are eager to see Coach Kunkle continue the excitement this program has generated the last few seasons."

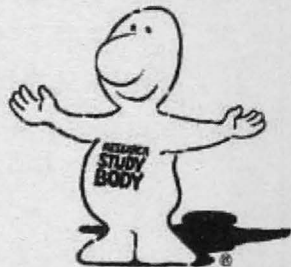
