Christmas Madrigal Feastes

A new script with more comedic touches and changes in the traditional old English roast beef menu will be among the variations as the Mid-America Singers entertain old and new friends with the 1991 Christmas Madrigal Feastes, to be presented Thursday through Sunday, December 5-8. The Singers -- costumed as lords and ladies, serving wenches, and liveried servants -- will perform in the University Dining Room, authentically bedecked with Renaissance garlands and banners to simulate feastes of olden days. A town crier will introduce arriving guests, another innovation for the 1991 holiday celebration. Although dinner starts at 7:30 p.m. Thursday through Saturday and 6 p.m. Sunday, guests are urged to arrive up to 30 minutes early to pick up their tickets and be announced by the crier.

Tickets are \$19.50; a reduced price of \$14.50 is available to high school and college students. Anyone who wants to support the Mid-America Singers may make a \$50 contribution, \$30 of which goes to the Singers, and be listed in the Madrigal program as a Royale Guest. Tuesday, November 26 is the deadline for program listings. No reservations will be accepted by telephone and all tickets will be left at the door, rather than being mailed, in an effort to curb mailing costs.
