BLACK HISTORY TELECONFERENCE. A nationally televised program, "Beyond the Dream," will launch Black History Month on both the local and national levels. The teleconference will originate in Washington, D. C., and will be aired locally from 12 noon to 2 p.m. on Wednesday, February 1, in UC350. The program on "Black Issues in Education" will feature national leaders in discussions on education, politics, business and economics, social issues, the military, and arts, entertainment, and sports. The USI program is cosponsored by the Black Student Unions of USI and UE, the USI Office of Continuing Education, Delta Sigma Theta sorority, PRIDE, Omega Psi Phi fraternity, and the Evansville-Vanderburgh School Corporation. The program is free and open to the public. Interested persons are urged to arrive early because the telecast begins at 12 noon.

AIDS FORUM. A public forum to discuss the varying viewpoints on AIDS, with a goal of finding a common ground in the community to approach the illness, will be held at 7 p.m. Friday, January 27, in Forum I. The program is cosponsored by the University and Leadership Evansville as part of a series of public discussions on the issues of AIDS, health care for the elderly, and the national debt. **Dr. Charles F. Petranek**, chairman of the Sociology Department, will moderate the public discussion on AIDS, opening the program with a 20-minute videotape that explains four viewpoints on the illness -- moral, educational, medical screening, and finding a cure through research. Dr. Petranek said the Town Hall type meetings were scheduled to involve the community in discussing national problems. He said Leadership Evansville also has books available for study on the three issues.

SCHOOL OF BUSINESS REORGANIZATION. **Dr. Glenn A. Pitman**, dean of the School of Business, has announced the recent creation of these four departments in the School: Accounting and Business Law, Economics and Finance, Administrative and Decision Sciences and Business Education, and Management and Marketing. Department heads will not be named until the 1989-90 academic year. Dr. Pitman said **Mr. Bill Henderson**, assistant professor of business administration, has been named acting director for Academic Support Services.

The Curricular Committee also has received a petition to modify the Bachelor of Science degree (non-teaching) in English. The Department proposes to delete this degree program because it is believed English majors should have at least minimal experience with a foreign language.

RECIPES. Here are the recipes requested after the Faculty/Staff luncheon.

Summer Lime Chicken Breasts

These are so moist and full of flavor, you'll never think about them being skinless. If cilantro isn't available, try fresh parsley, dill, tarragon, thyme, rosemary or oregano; or use 1 tablespoon dried herb, crushed.

4 boneless and skinless chicken breasts, 1/2 pound each
1/3 cup olive oil
Juice of 3 limes
4 cloves of garlic, peeled and minced
3 tablespoons fresh cilantro, chopped
1/2 teaspoon each of salt and freshly ground black pepper
Red and yellow peppers, roasted (optional)

1. Trim fat from chicken breasts and cut out middle tendon. Pound between waxed paper to flatten slightly.
2. Combine olive oil, lime juice, garlic, 2 tablespoons cilantro, salt and pepper in a bowl. Pour over chicken and marinate for 1 hour.
3. Grill or broil the chicken breasts for 2 minutes on each side. Remove to platter. Sprinkle with remaining cilantro and serve with roasted red and yellow peppers.

Broccoli Primavera

A salad loaded with fresh garden vegetables and tossed in a lovely light mustard sauce.

1 bunch of broccoli
3 medium carrots, peeled and cut into 1/4-inch dice
1 medium yellow squash, cut in half lengthwise and then into 1/4-inch slices
1 red bell pepper, cored and cut into 1/4-inch dice
1 cup cooked peas
Grated zest of 1 lemon
2 tablespoons chopped Italian parsley
3/4 cup Mustard Vinaigrette (recipe follows)

1. Trim stems off broccoli and cut tops into small florets.
2. In boiling water, blanch carrots 1 minute; drain and refresh under cold water. Blanch broccoli and squash 30 seconds each; drain and refresh under cold water. Pat vegetables dry with paper towels.
3. In a bowl, combine broccoli, carrots, squash, pepper, peas, lemon zest and parsley. Just before serving, toss gently with vinaigrette. Serve immediately.
