REGISTRATION ORIENTATION FOR FALL SEMESTER 1983. COLLEGE INFORMATION PROGRAM FOR WOMEN. The Office of Continuing Education is sponsoring a free information program for women interested in beginning or resuming college study. The program will be held tonight, August 10, from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. in the University Conference Center, Room 350. Topics to be included are admission to college, university costs, and information on the job market. A panel of women, who currently are students at ISUE, will discuss the special concerns of nontraditional-age-women students. The program will be of interest to all women who have considered beginning or resuming their college study after a period of time away from the classroom.
