

Gregory to speak at fall meeting

The Fall Faculty/Administration Meeting will be held at 8:30 a.m. Monday, August 21, in Mitchell Auditorium, with 1995 fall classes slated to start Monday, August 28.

The featured speaker for the fall meeting will be Dr. Marshall Gregory, who holds the Harry Ice Chair of English at Butler University, Indianapolis. Dr. Gregory was national director of the Lilly Endowment's Post-Doctoral Teaching Awards program in the mid-'80s and for the past 12 years, has been coauthor with Wayne Booth of successive editions of Harper & Row Reader and Harper & Row Rhetoric.

Dr. Joseph DiPietro, assistant professor of geology, will give a one-hour talk at 12 noon Tuesday, August 15, in SC253, an update on his work in the mountains of Northern Pakistan and the people who live there. Working under a \$250,000 grant from the National Science Foundation, he is searching for clues to earth formations and movements the last 200 million years and their effect on climate, including the greenhouse effect. Dr. DiPietro first went to Pakistan nine years ago while studying for his Ph.D. at Oregon State University. Under the NSF grant, he returned there for three months in the fall of 1994, and will spend three months there this fall, and 45 days there in both 1996 and 1997.
