UNICEF GREETING CARDS

More and more people are realizing each year that sending UNICEF Greeting Cards is an especially effective way to express the holiday spirit. Every UNICEF Card that is received carries a message of concern for the vulnerable youngsters of the World as well as seasonal greetings to family, friends or colleagues. And each UNICEF Card that is sent can spell the difference between hope and despair, health and disease, education and illiteracy to some needy child in Asia, Africa, Latin America of the Middle East.

The beauty of UNICEF cards is almost as diverse in style and content as the 111 nations on four continents whose children are helped by the United Nations Children's Fund. This year's collection of 30 designs from 14 countries and the Vatican spans the centuries, ranging in global culture from a "Nativity" by Benozzo Gozzoli of Renaissance Italy to a contemporary "Mother and Child" by Elizabeth Catlett, a U.S. born black sculptor now living in Mexico.

But the most attractive aspect of UNICEF Cards is always the humanitarian one. For the past 24 years, the generosity of the artists and museums that contribute the designs, the volunteers who sell them and the well-wishers who buy them has enabled UNICEF to broaden the scope of its efforts in the fields of child nutrition, mother and child health care, clean water supply, education and family planning.

The sale of UNICEF Cards accounts for approximately 10% of UNICEF's annual budget for long-term child assistance programs in developing countries...and for the emergency needs too often caused by natural catastrophes and man-made strife. In terms of individual purchases:

A box of cards will buy 20 medicine droppers for a health center.

Five boxes will buy 16 baby chicks for an applied nutrition program.

A \$5 Gift Pack will buy 200 pencils for schoolroom use.

OPEN ENROLLMENT BLUE CROSS-BLUE SHIELD

The Blue Cross-Blue Shield group insurance program at Indiana State University Evansville provides that once each year during the month of November an open enrollment period is made available to all faculty, administration, and clerical/support employees who have not previously been enrolled.

If you make cash payment (\$6.50 individual, \$18.00 family) on or before November 1, 1973, it is possible for your insurance to become effective November 10, 1973. If you choose to wait and commence payments by means of payroll deductions, the effective day may be December 10, 1973, or January 10, 1974, depending on the date you complete your enrollment card.
