USI's 22nd Commencement will be held at 7 p.m. Saturday, May 9, in Roberts Stadium, when some 860 students will be eligible to receive associate, bachelor and master degrees.

Dr. George B. Weathersby, former Indiana Commissioner for Higher Education and a member of the first USI Board, will bring the Commencement address. Honorary degrees will be conferred upon Dr. Weathersby; Mrs. Bettye B. McCutchan, life member and secretary of the USI Foundation Board of Directors; and Mr. William A. Koch, developer of Holiday World.

The 1992 Distinguished Professor Award will be presented to Dr. Aldo F. Cardarelli, professor of education and chair of the Teacher Education Department, and the President's Medal, highest honor for a graduating senior, will be presented to Mrs. Debbie L. Seib, an accounting and computer information systems major who will graduate magna cum laude.

FIRST PRESIDENTIAL SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENTS TO GRADUATE

It was just four years ago that University and USI Foundation officials devised the scholarship program that would bring many of Indiana's brightest and best to the University of Southern Indiana.

They established the Presidential Scholarship for Hoosier valedictorians and salutatorians. The award assures students the cost of tuition fees, books, and room and board at USI will be met, a potential of nearly \$20,000 over four years.

Fourteen of that original group will receive degrees at the 1992 Commencement ceremony. A 15th member -- Ms. Bethany J. Nuss of Brownstown -- became the first to graduate in 1991, having completed her studies in just under three years. She was 1988 valedictorian at Brownstown Central and graduated magna cum laude from USI with a B.S. in mathematics.

Another Presidential Scholar, Ms. Laura L. Huber of Cannelton, will graduate summa cum laude this year. Ms. Huber is an elementary education major who has maintained a 3.987

grade point average (in a 4.0 system). She was valedictorian of the 1988 graduating class at Cannelton High School and is the daughter of Thomas T. and Jane R. Huber of Cannelton, Indiana. She also is a cousin of USI Trustee J. David Huber.

The 1992 honors graduates include 32 at the magna cum laude (3.8 and above) level and 61 at the cum laude (3.6 and above) level. Twelve of them are Presidential Scholars. Besides Ms. Huber, graduating scholarship recipients include:

Ms. Paula J. Baughn - B.A. communications, cum laude; Central High School, Evansville, valedictorian; she is the daughter of Robert and Laura Baughn of Evansville. A funding source database is being installed on two computers in the Library computer lab. The database -- OFF GrantSearch -- contains information on funding sources for faculty research, academic program development, and the acquisition of instructional and research equipment. Both private and federal government sources are included.

GrantSearch was compiled and formatted for use on an IBM personal computer by the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU) Office of Federal Programs (OFF). The database is very simple to operate but has user instructions, and a Keyword and Search Code System Manual.

Dr. Peggy F. Harrel, coordinator of Grants and Sponsored Research, will demonstrate the program at 10:30 a.m. Tuesday, May 19, in the Graduate Studies Office, AD104. No registration is necessary.
