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Consul General of Japan will speak at USI luncheon

The Honorable Mitoji Yabunaka, Consul General of Japan in Chicago, will present the lecture "The Big Bang in Japan's Business World," at the Tri-State World Trade Council's luncheon meeting from 11:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Thursday, March 16, in Carter Hall of the University Center.

Mr. Timothy Mahoney, instructor in economics, said, "Japan is coming out of a prolonged recession, and this slowdown has forced some changes. Their economy is experiencing some restructuring and as a result it is more open to foreign investment and joint ventures with U.S. and European companies. In addition, some of the traditional distribution channels that favored Japanese goods and kept out imported goods are opening up."

General Yabunaka, a graduate of Cornell University, is one of the top Japanese officials in the U.S. who represents the commercial interests of Japan. He has served his country in diplomatic and trade related roles in London, Geneva, Korea, and Indonesia. His presentation will cover aspects of trade with Japan focusing on U.S. and Japan business relations and U.S. exports.

"With a recovering Japan and an economy more open to imports, the opportunities for Indiana exporters is brighter than it has been in some time," Mr. Mahoney said.

Local television personalities Mr. Brad Byrd and Ms. Shelly Kirk will conduct workshops along with **Mr. Ron Roat**, associate professor of journalism; **Mr. Jamie Beam**, lecturer in liberal arts; and **Mr. John Morris**, WSWI general manager and lecturer in communications.

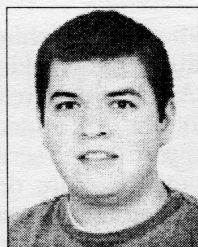
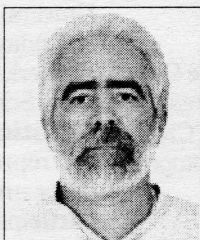
