Cultural genocide and racial profiling are topics to be discussed in Liberal Arts Colloquium at USI on February 23

A sociology instructor with expertise on cultural genocide in North America and a philosophy professor who teaches a course on racism in America will be featured during the second Liberal Arts Colloquium to be held at 3:30 p.m. on Friday, February 23, in Forum Annex III of the Wright Administration Building at the University of Southern Indiana.

Dr. Steven Williams will discuss the cultural genocide of native people in North America, but particularly in the area that became north and western Canada. He will present an analysis of early capitalist practices that created a dependency among natives and induced such social and cultural changes as the transformation of egalitarian gender roles and the rise of private property and land ownership.

Dr. Stephen Sullivan, whose specialty in philosophy is ethics, will discuss the nature and morality of racial profiling. Dr. Sullivan is a member of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People and is organizing a chapter at USI. Dr. Sullivan will talk about the nature, occurrence, and morality of racial profiling.

The colloquium is a lecture series designed to showcase faculty research in the School of Liberal Arts. It is open to the public.
