Buy a USI license plate and win \$100

Order a 1999 University of Southern Indiana License Plate by January 31, 1999, and have a chance to win a \$100 cash prize. The USI Foundation offers this prize drawing to promote sales of the USI collegiate license plate.

USI needs to double sales of its collegiate license plates to 650 annually to remain in the Indiana specialty plate program. The Indiana General Assembly has enacted legislation that requires groups with special license plates to sell at least 2,000 plates from 1997 through the end of the year 2000. Groups that do not meet the minimum number will lose their special plate.

Two \$100 cash drawings will take place on February 1, 1999, in the USI Office of Alumni and Volunteer Services. One drawing will include USI student license plate purchasers and the second drawing will be for all others.

USI students may purchase a plate at a reduced price of \$22 - a \$10 donation to student scholarships, plus a \$12 processing fee that is paid to the state at the time the plate is picked up.

All others, including alumni, employees, and friends, may purchase a plate for \$37 - a \$25 scholarship donation, plus the \$12 processing charge by the state.

USI license plate forms may be acquired from the Alumni and Volunteer Services Office, the Orr Center lobby desk, or at the University Center information desk. For Information, call 812/464-1924.

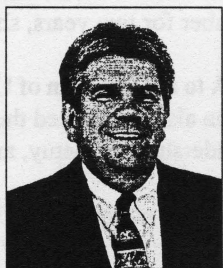
