#### NON-TRADITIONAL STUDENT MENTORS NEEDED

A spring 1994 study on the need of non-traditional students (age 25 and older) for mentors was the topic of a paper, "Mentoring Needs of Non-traditional Students," which was presented in April at the annual convention of the Southern States Communications Association by Ms. Karen H. Bonnell, USI assistant professor of communications.

More than 2,600 students are considered non-traditional students at USI; two-thirds are female and 72 percent are part-time, carrying less than 12 credit hours of study. Their most prevalent majors are in business, education, nursing, and social work.

The study drew 137 student responses showing 82 percent have no mentor and 81 percent feel a mentor could help them, with peer mentors preferred to faculty mentors. They said hopes by rencouragement, speak-

ing candidly about a protege's behavior, setting a professional example, listening to a protege, acting as a role model, and providing social support are more important than inviting a protege to work on special projects or helping the student win awards or recognition.
