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SCHOLARSHIP FUND OFF TO GOOD START AT USI. Seventeen members of the USI faculty and staff have contributed or pledged to the new Presidential Scholarship Fund, helping to raise more than \$650 in the first week of the special fund drive. The fund drive was launched last week by the USI Foundation, seeking support or endowment for the Presidential Scholarships that are being offered to current high school valedictorians or salutatorians who indicate interest in attending USI. A total of 30 Hoosier students were offered Presidential Scholarships — renewable awards valued at \$4,500 a year — for the 1988-89 academic year. To date, 22 have accepted and are expected to complete freshmen pre-registration by June 10. Donations or payroll deductions from USI faculty and staff will be added to the restricted Presidential Scholarship fund to help underwrite these special merit awards that are expected to attract many of Indiana's brightest students to USI. Contributions or pledges to the USI Foundation may be made in the Development Office.

NEW WOMEN'S BASKETBALL COACH NAMED. Ms. M. Felicia Cavallini has been named the new women's basketball coach, coming to USI after four years as assistant women's coach at Providence College in Rhode Island. She joined the staff last week and, in addition to coaching duties, will teach some physical education courses and be coordinator of the Physical Activities Center. Ms. Cavallini is a native of San Antonio, Texas, and received her B.A. from Rice University and her master's from the University of Texas at San Antonio. She lettered in basketball all four years at Rice and won numerous awards. Prior to coaching at Providence, she was the assistant coach and aerobics coordinator for men's and women's intercollegiate sports programs at Siena College in Loudonville, New York, and at UTSA. Well-versed in coaching, nutrition, and conditioning, Ms. Cavallini has written articles on these topics, including "Basketball and Aerobic Conditioning" which was published in the Athletic Journal and a similar article published in the Scholastic Coach.
