**REGISTRATION CHANGES DRAWING RAVE REVIEWS.** The computerized registration system worked like a charm for the second summer registration, drawing rave reviews from students who appreciate the easier matriculation. The plaudits come not only from those who registered for second summer but from the students who pre-registered for fall classes and now are able to make schedule changes by telephone or pay fees by mail, rather than standing in the long lines of the past. The wait has been pared also because the students fill out small forms listing the classes desired, and the computer operator can tell them immediately whether the class is filled.

**Mr. John Deem**, USI registrar, said about two-thirds of the fall student body -- those who pre-registered last spring -- now are able to handle some of the registration process by telephone and mail. The system has allowed fall registration to be reduced to only two days -- August 20 for new freshmen, and August 21 for any new student.

Congratulations to all the staff in the offices of Registrar, Admissions, Financial Aids, and Accounting and the Computer Center who have worked diligently to get the new system up and running.

**NAMES IN THE NEWS.** **Dr. Charles F. Petranek**, professor of sociology, has returned from Toulon, France, where he presented two papers at the International Simulation and Gaming Association's 17th annual conference, which was attended by professors from all over the world. Dr. Petranek's papers included "Symbolic Interactionist's Perspective of Simulation" and "Hospital," a simulation he developed that is used by medical personnel and played in his course, Simulated Games of Society.

The artistic talent of **Ms. Grace Waitman**, daughter of **Dr. Michael Waitman**, USI associate professor of English, has won her honors for the second time this summer -- the grand prize in the Schnuck's North Freedom Festival-Thunder poster coloring contest, open to the 11-to-14 age group.

**COPYING COST REDUCED.** The cost of copying for the 1986-87 fiscal year will be reduced from \$.03 to \$.025. All other charges, such as colored or legal paper, front-to-back copies, credit, and furnished paper, will remain the same.

**COMPUTER COST REDUCED.** IBM has announced that prices on the PC computer have been reduced, effective July 11 through December 31, 1986. The price for Model 5150-166 with green monochrome display, 256K memory, one disk drive, display and printer adapter, keyboard, and DOS 3.1, is \$1,010. The same equipment with two disk drives -- Model 5150-176 -- is \$1,060. Also available is Model 5150-176 with color display, 256K memory, two disk drives, color/graphic monitor adapter, and DOS 3.1 for \$1,482. Orders may be placed through the USI Purchasing Office.

**MEDICAL EDUCATION SEMINARS.** The Evansville Center for Medical Education will be the host for a series of seminars through July 31, all to be held at 3 p.m. in Room 328 of the Health Sciences Building at the University of Evansville. Receptions will follow each session in Room 302. The seminar speakers and topics will include: Thursday, July 24 -- **Dr. Ricky Ballou**, Ph.D., a research associate in the Department of Ophthalmology, University of Louisville School of Medicine, "The Effects of cis-Hydroxyproline in Experimental Proliferative Vitreoretinopathy;" Tuesday, July 29 -- **Dr. Paul May**, Ph.D., Department of Physiology and Biophysics, New York University Medical Center, "Anatomy and Physiology of Collicular Function;" and Thursday, July 31 -- **Dr. Frank G. Williams**, Ph.D., a Baltimore researcher, "Prelysosomal Processing of <sup>125</sup>I-insulin by Rat Liver in vivo."

**GALLERY FEATURING RANSOM EXHIBITION.** The New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art is presenting "Musical Ceramic Sculpture" by **Mr. Brian Ransom** of Claremont, California, as its contribution to the New Harmony Festival of Music (see **SUMMER FESTIVALS**). His work will remain on display through

Thursday, July 31 at the Gallery and he will perform on his musical sculpture at 1 p.m. Sunday, July 27 at Thrall's Opera House. Playing with him will be his wife, **Ms. Emily Phelps**, who sings and teaches music to children; **Ms. Cristina Gutierrez**, **Mr. Robert Kotulek**, and **Ms. Brook Reindollar**, all University of Evansville students, and **Mr. Carl Kautzman**, who has been a musician for 30 years. Tickets are available for \$2 in advance at the Gallery or Thrall's Opera House, or for \$3 the day of the performance. The project is co-sponsored by the New Harmony State Historic Site and is funded in part by the Indiana Arts Commission and the National Endowment for the Arts.

Mr. Ransom's pieces are unique in that they are functional -- actual musical instruments for which he composes music. While the instruments have a primitive feeling, the music they produce is contemporary and innovative; undertones of jazz, blues, and tribal music are fused with a synthesizer. The complexity of Mr. Ranson's compositions is illustrated in five scores that are part of his exhibition. Mr. Ransom holds art degrees from Alfred University in New York, the University of Oklahoma at Tulsa, and Claremont Graduate School. In 1979 he was a Fulbright Fellowship research specialist at the Universidad de San Marcos in Lima, Peru.
