FACULTY AND STAFF FEE WAIVER PLAN.

Effective the first summer term of 1975 fees for faculty and staff wishing to take courses on the ISUE Employee Fee Waiver Plan will be changed to \$7 per credit hour instead of \$5 per credit hour.

This change in fee is due to internal shift of fees for ISUE.

Questions relative to the change may be directed to the Office of Student Financial Aids.

SICK LEAVE POLICY CHANGE. Effective immediately, the following additions to the University's sick leave policy are in force:

Dental and medical appointments should be scheduled, preferably, outside normal working hours. If this is impractical, medical and dental appointments scheduled during regular hours with the prior approval of the department head will be charged to sick leave time.

When the illness of immediate family living in the home forces an employee to stay at home or take time off, said time off will be counted as sick leave to a maximum of five (5) days per fiscal year.

Sick leave with pay will continue to be granted on the basis of one working day of sick leave accumulated for each month or portion of a month of service. Sick leave will not be granted during the probationary period.

BICENTENNIAL SYMPOSIUM HELD AT NEW HARMONY. Approximately 200 history enthusiasts from across the country attended the Bicentennial symposium which was held in New Harmony at Thrall's Opera House on May 16 and 17. Six professors from various universities spoke on historical topics. An afternoon round-table discussion allowed for dialogue between the speakers and their audience.

The symposium, organized by *John Elliott*, Adjunct Asst. Professor of Anthropology, and *Donald E. Pitzer*, Professor of History, was the first of four projected Bicentennial meetings sponsored by the Indiana American Revolution Bicentennial Commission. Several favorable comments on the organization and planning of this conference were received from the symposium participants.

An account of the New Harmony session will be published by the Indiana Historical Society.

NON CREDIT COURSES TO BE OFFERED THIS SUMMER. The ISUE Office of Continuing Education will be offering six non-credit courses this summer. The courses include an introductory course in painting and water colors, a beginning tennis class, a communication course, an introduction to football officiating course, and introduction to wildlife biology, and a Lamaze childbirth preparation course.

AN INTRODUCTORY COURSE IN PAINTING AND WATER COLORS will be offered at ISUE beginning June 10 for five Tuesdays and Thursdays. The class will begin at 6:30 p.m. This is a course for beginners and will introduce basic water color and painting media and the uses of each. Registration fee is \$25.00, but does not include cost of materials. Enrollment is limited to 25 and is offered by Assistant Professor of Art, *Jack Cascione*.

A BEGINNING TENNIS CLASS, with a section for children and a section for adults, is one of the non-credit courses scheduled. The children's class will be offered in two sections, with children aged 10-12 scheduled 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. on Mondays and Wednesdays for 4 weeks, June 16 through July 9, and children aged 13-16 scheduled 10:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. four Mondays and Wednesdays June 16 through July 9. The children's class fee is \$15.00.

One adult section will be offered four Tuesdays and Thursdays, 7:00 p.m. - 8:00 p.m. June 17 through July 10 and another section will be offered on Tuesdays and Thursdays, 8:30 p.m. - 9:30 p.m. June 17 through July 10. The registration fee is \$17.50.

Beginning tennis is designed to introduce participants to the basic tennis strokes, footwork, rules, and court positions. Participants must furnish their own racquet and balls. Enrollment is limited to 16 in each section. The children's class will be conducted by *James Brown*, Instructor in Physical Education, and the adult class will be conducted by *Jack Marr*, Varsity Tennis Coach.

A COMMUNICATION COURSE emphasizing self-awareness and self-identity as they are developed through communication and human relationships will be offered this summer beginning June 9 at 6:30 p.m. The course, to be conducted by *Brad Awe*, Instructor in Communications, will cover the process of communication, barriers to communication, development of communication relationships, meaning, environmental probing and perception. The five-week course will include lecture, discussions, and participation activities. Registration fee is \$20.00.

Jack Behme, Certified IHSAA Official, will be conducting an **INTRODUCTION TO FOOTBALL OFFICIATING COURSE** at ISUE beginning July 15 at 8:30 p.m. This course is designed for the interested fan or potential official who wants a thorough interpretation of the rules and officiating techniques of the game of football. On-field experiences in officiating will be arranged for interested participants. The IHSAA licensing examination, required of registered officials, may be taken upon completion of the course. An additional \$10.00 fee will be charged for the examination. Enrollment is limited to 35 and cost of the five-week course is \$25.00.

INTRODUCTION TO WILDLIFE BIOLOGY, a five-week course, begins July 7 at 6:00 p.m. and will be conducted by *Johnny Reising*, Instructor in Life Science. The course covers the identification, ecology, life cycles and management of animals, with emphasis on the game species native to the Tri-State area. Two off-campus field trips are planned to illustrate modern wildlife management techniques. Enrollment is limited to 20. Registration fee is \$22.50.

NON-CREDIT COURSES, CONTINUED. THE LAMAZE METHOD OF PREPARED CHILDBIRTH will be conducted through a cooperative program offered by ISUE and Deaconess Hospital. Classes will be held Tuesdays beginning July 8 at Deaconess and Thursdays beginning July 10 at ISUE in the University Center. Both will run from 7 to 9 p.m. once a week and each is limited to 15 couples. The Lamaze Method enables couples to cope with the psychological changes of pregnancy, labor and delivery, decreases fear and apprehension through education; and provides physical conditioning for the expectant mother. Instructors will be Paula Cockrum, certified childbirth educator, of ISUE, and Linda Simpson, R.P.T., asst. director of physical medicine at Deaconess. Cost of the course is \$20.00.

SPORTS ROUND-UP,

A very strong spring baseball schedule proved to be too tough for the ISUE baseball Eagles. The 8-23 Eagles faced seven teams this spring that received post-season bids to the NAIA and NCAA tournaments. This factor, along with the youthfulness of this year's squad, was reason enough for the relatively long spring.

However, Coach Jim Brown's Eagles did have some bright moments. They were able to win three out of five games from cross town rival Univ. of Evansville who received an NCAA post-season invitation. All-District second baseman, Gary Redman, hit a team leading .311 while fielding .970 at his position. Senior righthander John Warner's two wins and 3.05 ERA and ace reliever Tom Hammerstein's 1.89 ERA provided the moundsmen some positive moments.

Coach Brown remarked on this year's team, "the team was young and gained valuable experience which should help to provide a nucleus for next year. Help is needed on the mound, catching and at one in-field position for next season. We must have this in order to compete successfully against our schedule."

The Eagles will graduate infielders Gary Redman and Dave Bell, plus pitcher John Warner from this year's squad.

The ISUE GOLF TEAM finished second in this year's District No. 21 Championship held May 16 in Indianapolis. Franklin College captured the title following two rounds at 628. The Eagles finished 11 points behind, scoring a total of 639. Low men for ISUE included Bill Sherwood at 155 and Ken Swango at 156 following 2 rounds.

With 5 returning lettermen, Golf Coach Jim Hamilton is looking ahead to winning next year's District No. 21 Golf Championship. Overall, Coach Hamilton feels his young talented golf team played extremely well this year.
