that workers had to go home because of allergies and sinus difficulties.
"It was really bad," said Rita Brunner of extended services. "I know I had to get out of it

There were also unconfirmed reports of workers in the building that had constricted throats because of the fumes.

When reports of the chemical spill came out, security officers were assigned to the scene. After they reviewed the area, they told workers to evacuate the building if they were feeling sick from the spill.

There were warnings on all doors that security person
reporters gained access into the generator area, there was still a pungent odor coming from diesel fuel and sanitizers.

There were reports of a half-gallon of fuel spilled because of backflow in the generator.
"An outside contractor brought the fuel but a physical plant person was there," said Jerry Bulger, head maintenance coordinator. "I would have to get my records to tell me that if it was a hazardous situation.
"We did not have any
injury or illness reports filed," said Darlene Fisher,
the spill lasted about two hours.

By the time second shift operators for telephone services came in, there was no smell.

Diesel Fuel is a hazardous material explained by the government's Occupational Health and Safety Administration through their website. The hazardous materials book, which is on the web, shows that repeated contact should be avoided and that all contaminated clothing should be laundered before re-use. Any prolonged ingestion should be seen by a physician.

# Lady Eagles advance to Elite Eight, 86-77 

The USI women's basketball team advanced to the NCAA Division II Elite Eight for the second time in school history with its 86-77 victory over Northern Michigan University.

The Lady Eagles forced 29 Wildcat turnovers en route to their 15 consecutive victory.

After a back-and-forth first half battle, the Eagles claimed a 35-32 halftime lead. USI shot 48.4 percent from the field in the first half, but 11 turnovers prevented it from gaining a large advantage.

The second half went much smoother for the Eagles as they committed
just six turnovers while forcing 15 Northern Michigan turnovers. After a pair of free throws from tournament MVP, Liz Prewett, junior guard Jasmine Moore stole the ball from senior guard Brianne Weber and dished in a lay up to put the Eagles in a commanding 73-65 lead with $2: 19$ left in the game. USI's final 13 points came off free throws
as it clinched the Great Lakes Regional championship.

Prewett led the Eagles with a game-high 21 points and nine rebounds while senior Natalie Glaser dished in 18 points. Moore contributed 19 points and
six assists as she was named to the AllTournament team.

Senior center Jill Gobert and sophomore forward Maryellen Poutanen led the Wildcats with 19 and 20 points, respectively. Poutanen also recorded nine rebounds. Both were named All-Tournament.

Northern Michigan finishes its season with a 24-6 overall record.

USI, which raised its record to $28-3$ with the win, will face top ranked Columbus State University (30-0) in the quarterfinals of the Elite Eight on Wednesday, March 21. Game time will be announced.

University of Southern Indiana freshman Jenny Farmer, finished ninth in the finals of the mile at the 2001 NCAA Division II Indoor Track and Field Championships at the Reggie Lewis Center in Boston, Massachusetts, Saturday afternoon.

With the ninth place showing and a time of 4:58.18, Farmer finishes one spot away from being named All-American.

In the preliminaries on Friday night, Farmer finished third in the first heat
